LOCAL BRIEFS.

Lawyer From Point-Blanc—Arthur E. Christensen has removed from Point-Blanc to this city, to form a law firm with his brother, Parley P. Christensen.

J. W. W. Lecture—National Organizer Joseph W. W. will speak in Eastman's hall on State street at 2:30 p. m., tomorrow, upon "Industrial Conditions."

Jack Rabbits Numerous—The jack rabbits are reported unusually thick in the southern part of the state, so that residents are sending in to this city for ammunition with which to take the field against the enemy at an early day.

Funeral of William Gibson—The funeral of William Gibson, who was killed by a horse on Friday, Tuesday, will be held from the Thirty-first ward meetinghouse at 2:30 p. m., tomorrow, with interment in the city cemetery.

Poisoning—Chief Officer E. S. B. of the Associated Press was poisoned by a poisonous substance yesterday afternoon, after eating a dish of tongue in a downtown restaurant. The prompt services of a physician enabled him to recover.

Fuel Company Buys Ranch—The Consolidated Fuel company completed last evening its deal with P. J. Nielson of Miller creek for his ranch, in order to acquire a fuel rights. The entire acre involved is given at \$25,000.

The City's License Record—The city treasurer has received fees from 4,414 licensees during the year, according to City Recorder Moreton's figures. The licensees are as follows: Liquor saloon, 473; druggist, 111; wholesaler, 5; manufacturer, 12; merchants, 2,288; miscellaneous, 2,065.

Hill Killed in Utah—Elmer E. Hill who died Wednesday in Denver, is known by name and place throughout the west and particularly throughout Utah, Colorado and Wyoming as these three states were said to have been under his control as head of the denigration bureau.

Not Afraid of Thirteen—The State Bar association will meet Jan. 13. After electing officers while in session in the Federal building in Denver, the association of Pres. Parley L. Williams, the lawyers will adjourn to the Commercial club, where a banquet will be served and a number of talks made by Utah's famous minds and wits.

Blue Outlook for Vacation—The local custom house is in receipt of advice of the arrival of 25 sales of Parvian horses for a Salt Lake breeding farm. There are said to be so many imports that Collector Greenwald can not yet see any opportunity to take the vacation he has been looking for during the last few weeks.

Convention of Church Workers—President Kingsbury of the state university is in receipt of an invitation from the Church and Guild societies of the University of Michigan, to send a delegate from the U. of U. to a convention of church workers to be held at Ann Arbor, March 31, April 1 and 2, in the evening.

Returns From the East—Bishop P. S. Spaulding returned last evening from a three months' trip through the east in the interest of the Utah diocese. He says: "I found the people notwithstanding the hard times, and we have every reason to feel encouraged in our work." The bishop will preach in St. Mark's cathedral tomorrow.

Advertisers Incorporate—The Globe Advertising Novelty company has filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state. The company's capital stock is \$100,000, divided into 1,000 shares. The officers are: Edward T. Stewart, president; Job White, secretary; Clarence L. Nix, secretary; and Louis C. Smith, treasurer. The company takes over the business of Smith & Stewart.

Greeks Postpone Pleading—The two Greeks charged with robbing the Bamberger mailboxes and extracting letters, some of which were being brought by Commissioner Charles Baldwin yesterday and upon a statement from their attorney that neither could speak enough English to plead, they were given until Jan. 7. Not having \$3,000 apiece they were put under lock and key in the county jail.

Bishop Moore Expected—Bishop David H. Moore is expected to arrive in this city this afternoon, over the Rio Grande from Denver, on route to Honolulu. He will remain in Salt Lake over Sunday and Monday morning, and then proceed to the first Methodist church, also, ordain two candidates for the ministry from Colville and Provo. Messrs. H. H. Johnston and C. J. McKelton.

Advise Against Closing—Secy. Beatty of the board of health was called up yesterday afternoon by telephone from Salt Lake, his report asking his advice to the closing of the schools on account of there being 130 families under quarantine at Lehi for the measles. He advised that the schools be not closed, but to allow no children from infected homes to attend, and to enforce the quarantine strictly.

The City's Realty—In accordance with the ordinance requiring heads of departments to show the city's assets under their control, Frank Matthews, land and water commissioner, yesterday filed with the recorder his report showing the city's property to be worth \$1,192,271.19. Of this amount the city's portion of the joint building is listed at \$549,994.46. Other property, \$100,000 and Liberty park, \$250,000. The report also includes the value of the city's buildings in the canyons and elsewhere.

Indian War Veterans Returning—Those well-known veterans of the Black Hawk Indian wars, Messrs. Harrison, Pratt and Westwood, passed through Salt Lake on Friday, returning to their several homes in Utah county. They had been in attendance at the funeral of their old comrade, Gen. William H. Kimball at Council Bluffs, each taking a prominent part in the ceremonies and all singing the hymn, "Blest be the tie that binds." All were deeply affected by the funeral services which they described as having been most impressive and full of sympathy for the bereaved family.
