THE BLACK EVENING COAT.

The empire coat, so popular this winter, is a splendid model for the woman you would add inches to her height, but she would best choose the garment which defines her waist line, leaving this for her more stately sister. And for her the illustration shows an excellent example in a soft black satin, in the full skirt of which is set a deep band of Lyons velvet, this banded by double rows of black silk braid of two widths. The high turnback cuffs are treated in this same manner, and a princess effect is simulated in front by continuing the braid which trim the edges of the front up to the bust line. Rosettes of the braid and velvet are posed on either side of the front at the waist line, and also trim the skirt. As a dressy touch to what otherwise might be quite a sombre affair is added a broad rolling chinchilla collar which turns up snugly around the neck to reveal a collar of the satin, cape-like in its proportions, the edges piped with white satin and hand embroidered in oriental colorings, gold threads outline the whole pattern.
