STATELINE RICHES IN JOHNNY MINES

Large Bodies of Gold Await Completion of Mill.

REPORT FROM COL. HEFFRON

Majesty's Evidence of Permanence— Actively Working Strong Force.

Col. H. G. Heffron has returned from an extended trip to the southern part of the state in the interest of the Bingham Co. smelter in the capacity of purchasing agent. While absent he visited Stetline, and while it is producing nothing but milling ore at present he speaks well of the camp. The Oshkosh he reports as running satisfactorily and the 10-stamp mill and cyanide plant at the Johnny will be complete before the first of the year. He examined the ore bodies of the Johnny and sampled their worth with excellent results. There is plenty of ore blocked out he says to keep the mill running for an indefinite period, and while the management claim an average of \$12 in gold to the ton of the great mass revealed, by panning from numerous places he found an average of \$30. The company has one large east and west vein and a number of cross veins of smaller dimensions which carry exceedingly high values in the yellow metal and he considers it a great property.

Col. Heffron also visited the Majesty at Milford, obtaining fine copper samples in quartz on the 400-foot level as evidence, he says, of values to a much greater depth. A shaft is now being sunk from the 400-foot level to ascertain whether the ore will be sulphides or oxides so as to determine the nature of the smelter needed for treating it. The Majesty is working a strong force of men.

THE DAY ON CHANGE.

Sales Were Small With Prices Generally Maintained.

The transactions at the regular call and on open board were decidedly limited, the total sales aggregating only \$19,200.63. Trading was confined chiefly to the lower priced properties, but buyers were found for 11 different stocks.

Con. Mercantile with light sales was stronger and sold up to \$1.95 1/2. Little Bell receded to \$7 while only 150 shares changing hands.

California sold light and found buyers for \$4.00 shares at about 35 cents.

FOURTY YEARS AGO.

Veteran Miner Tells of Early Locations in Utah.

Isadore Morris, a veteran miner of Utah, this morning in speaking of the day being the forty-fourth anniversary of the establishment of Fort Douglas became reminiscent and gave some interesting history of early mining in Utah. While Mr. Morris was a soldier under command of Gen. Connor, his division did not arrive in Salt Lake until some months later, and since that time Mr. Morris has exercised his eyes for minerals in the area. The first in the mining locations that were made in Utah, Mr. Morris says, were the Jordan mine at Bingham on Sept. 17, 1853, by George H. Ogilvie and on the following day the same party located the Vindicator. These locations were the first ones recorded by Bishop Archibald Gardner, the first mining record of West Mountain district. Mr. Morris soon got an interest in these properties and the interest grew until he was practically the sole owner and the property was sold to Boston parties in 1853 for \$250,000, although until three years later, when a smelter was built, was the property a source of revenue. It is now a part of the United States Mining company's holdings. Mr. Morris was also on the ground early at Stockton and Cottonwood and witnessed the christening of many properties which afterwards became famous.

Ore in Carissa.

The Carissa yesterday contributed to the progress of the mining industry by uncovering a three foot ledge of ore in its workings. The ore occurred in the Northern 827 ground on the 60 foot level. The ore shows copper, silver and gold in good values.

Ajax Annual Meeting.

At the annual meeting of the Ajax Mining company yesterday the management was strengthened by the admission of P. L. Kimberly of Sharon, Pa., into the official circle. The directorate now includes Thomas Weir, P. L. Kimberly, George A. Lowe, W. S. McCormick, James Ryan, John M. Bart and Henry M. Ryan.

Strike in Uncle Sam.

An two-foot streak of gold-bearing quartz which promises to lend substantial aid in making a paying proposition of the Uncle Sam has been encountered in that company's grounds. The find was made yesterday in a stope above the tunnel level in the north drift, and samples sent to the offices disclosed free gold, the naked eye, while with the sold were chlorides carrying good values in silver although assays have not yet been made. Of course the importance and extent of the find have not been demonstrated, but the indications are most auspiciously favorable.

Snake River Company.

The Snake River Consolidated Mining company of this city filed articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office today. The company is capitalized at \$500,000, representing shares of \$5 each. The president is Solon Spiro, vice president is Edward McGarrig, secretary and treasurer. The company owns the Snake River, Reagen No. 1, Gill Edge, Golden Chest, Seven Thirty and Silver Link lead claims, situated in the Snake River district, Wasatch county.

New Tintle Concern.

The Balmkin Mining company, of Eureka, filed a copy of its articles of incorporation in the secretary of state's office today. The capital stock of the company is \$75,000, divided into 300,000 shares of the par value of 25 cents each. George M. Hays is president, Hugh H. Morgan, vice president, and W. W. Thompson, secretary and treasurer. The company has an option on the Hulton, Lead, North Bullion, West Bullion and East Bullion district, located in North Tintle district, Tooele county.

WESTERN MARKET LETTER.

Special Correspondence.

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 15.—The big majority of the 74,000 cattle received this week were in this district, not more than 15 or 20 per cent of the steers that arrived being suitable for beef.

The preponderance of light stuff has put the market for inferior kinds of stockers and feeders in probably the worst condition of the season. Up to the middle of the week the situation was at the low point, but since then receipts have been light, even for the end of the week, and this has permitted a slight recovery, even among the downer kinds that have languished so long.

The best beef that comes now brings about 7 1/2 or a little better, and none of that kind that formerly brought 8 or better has been here for several

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Considerable short feed, poorly finished stuff has been included in the receipts, and it has done better this week than last. The supply of quarantine cattle this week, as well as last, has been very much reduced, competition to give more attention to range stock on the native side, which has gradually improved each day this week. Especially on Friday range beef steers were in good demand at prices 15 to 25 cents higher than the first of the week. Meaty steers also closed the week strong and 10 to 15 cents higher than the beginning. Range beef steers sold as high as \$5.50 during the week, and cows up to \$3.50. Bulk of steers \$3.75 to \$4.40 and cows \$2.50 to \$3.25.

About 20,000 head of stockers and feeders went to the country last week and the number this week will be about the same. Nothing complimentary of the situation could be said up to Thursday of this week, but since then, arrivals of this class of stock have been exceedingly small, giving operators in this line a breathing spell, and whetting the appetites of such country buyers as were in the market. Evidence of new life in the trade could be discerned since Thursday, and not enough of the best kinds could be had. Even the poor kinds looked up a little, but are still in poor request. Stockers have sold as high as \$3 this week and feeders up to \$4.75, but the bulk of the stuff has moved at \$2.50 to \$4.25. Stock calves were 25 cents, except for those of good quality.

The general cattle market is closing the week with an upward tendency, and a satisfactory market is predicted for next week. It looks especially promising for country kinds of cattle, as next week is the week of the American Royal Cattle and Swine show, at the stock yards here, and among the thousands of visitors from country points, no doubt many will want to take home some cattle, putting off buying them till this occasion.

The show itself is attracting widespread attention, and the entries include the cream of all the show herds of pure bred cattle of this country. The show animals that have been touring the state fairs during the season are all concentrated here in grand competition for a final settlement of their claims to superiority. Four best breeds will be represented here, and three breeds of hogs, and an Angora goat, and a few other animals. All the cattle and swine associations will hold auction sales during the week, also the goat people will sell some of their favorite bred and auctioned stock. No doubt the combination will be the greatest ever held in the United States.

Sheep receipts this week amounted to 35,000 head, the biggest run ever had here. In spite of this killing, prices have advanced and are 10 to 20 cents higher than a week ago. Country kinds have been in better demand, and at auctioned prices. All the receipts of this class have been smaller than formerly. Utah lambs have sold up to \$1.10 for big hands. Several loads of New Mexico lambs sold at \$4.50 and wethers, yearlings, at \$3.70. Utah fat ewes sold at \$3.10 and wethers at \$2.65. A bunch of Arizona brought \$3.70. Feeding lambs sold from \$2.25 to \$3.50 and western feeders from \$2.75 to \$3.25. It would look from these quotations that prices were very little changed, which is true, but the feeling was better, and more sheep brought these prices.
