New York, April 9 .- Dispatches from Holland, says the Tribune London respondent, revive the rumor that Kruger is bent upon visiting the Unit-ed States during the summer. Private information from The Hague leads to the belief that his physician is strongly opposed to any course of action which will subject him to excitement. Mr. Kruger's general health is fair, but he has weak heart action and has been warned that he must live quietly. The talk about his American journey comes from Boer sympathizers in Holland, who are unwilling to admit that he has exhausted the resources of diplomacy and has nothing in reserve.

Young, who has just reached Washington after serving nearly two years in the Philippines, had this to years better the Philippines. had this to say about conditions in the islands "In the six weeks that have elapsed since I left the islands some important

changes have been wrought so that I am unable to say accurately just what I am unable to say accurately just what the situation is in Luzon now. I do believe, however, that the capture of Aguinaldo, and his acceptance of American authority will have a beneficial effect and no doubt a strong ten-dency to bring about peace and order. Some of the leaders will probably come in and surrender, as I see small bands are doing from day to day. It is im-possible to say what such men as Ale-

jandrino and Santos will do. They may decide to follow Aguinaldo's example and again they may be ambi-tious and desire to become leaders in his stead. Alejandrino, who has been spoken of as Aguinaldo's possible successor, is an able and intelligent Fili-pino, but I understand that his command is well scattered and small. Tino is the Filipino leader in northern Luzon and is quite active. Under him are and is quite active. Under him are perhaps 3,000 men, with more or less se and disconnected organization divided into guerrilla bands who drop down on quartermaster and commis-sary supply trains accompanied by small parties. A BRAVE SCHOOL TEACHER.

A Nebraska Girl Saves Her Pupils and the School Building.

Harrison, Neb., April 8.-Miss Lizzie E.
