### Every Available Room Occupied-Barratt Hall Nearing Completion.

The enrolment of students at the Lat ter-day Saints' University today exceeds the expectations of the most sanguine friends of the institution. The

total number of students enrolled this year is over 1,000. The business college leads among the various departments, with a total of 426 students, while the

high school, normal and preparatory, follow closely with 290 students. Be sides the Book of Mormon evening class, which numbers several hundred. and is not counted in the list of students, there are two special classes, the Sunday school training class and the evening missionary class, the for-mer with 77 and the latter with 107 members, making the entire enrolment to date 1,000 students; or, exclusive of the two special classes just named( \$16 in regular attendance. To this list s yet to be added the special students who may pursue German and Spanish with Instructors Snow and Ladico in

the evening classes. Every available room in the Business college, the Lion House and the Social Hall has been pressed into class-room service. There is room enough to do all the class work; but the professors in charge will experience a great re-tief when the completion of the Bar-

ratt hall shall have placed five more cooms and the large assembly room at their disposal. The new gymnasium will also be in

use within a short time. The trustees and teachers naturally feel encouraged at the generous support the people are giving to the school, and they are making every effort to re-tain the confidence which the people have in the work of this institution.

A site has not been positively chosen yet, the nearest approach to it being in a resolution that Mr. Geoghegan presented to the board Tuesday night. His resolution was to memorialize Congress for a tract of twenty acres along the west boundary line of the Fort Douglas res-servation.
