China to be Put into Direct Communication With Europe.
AMERICAN DEVELOPMENT CO
Important Concessions Granted Which Will Have Effect of Opening Up the Country.

New York, Jan. 8.—The announcement that the American development company has been organized on a firm basis and that an official demand has been made on the Chinese government for the issue of bonds against the construction of the Hankow-Canton railway, which has been chosen consisting of Messrs. Andrew Belmont, Perre Mall, Frederick W. Whitridge, Chas. A. Whitford and Mrs. Barclay Parsons of New York, and Col. Albert T. Parsons of the U. S. Army, is being received with interest here. The necessary funds have been subscribed by the stockholders and the company is now in a position to begin construction of the line which will connect the two cities of the East and the West.

A THOUSAND STUDENTS.
All Departments of L. D. S. University Have Unprecedented Success.
Every Available Room Occupied—Barratt Hall Nearing Completion.

The enrollment of students at the Latter-day Saints' University today exceeds the expectations of the most sanguine friends of the institution. The total number of students enrolled this year is over 1,000. The business college leads among the various departments, with a total of 426 students, while the high school, normal and preparatory, follow closely with 390 students. Besides the Book of Mormon evening class, which numbers several hundred, and is not counted in the list of students, there are two special classes, the Sunday school training class and the evening missionary class, the former with 71 and the latter with 107 members, making the entire enrollment to date 1,000 students; or, exclusive of the two special classes just named, 816 in regular attendance. This list is yet to be added the special students who may pursue German and Spanish, with instructors Snow and Ladice in the evening classes.
