# BREWERS PUZZLE THE COMMITTEE

Wise Councilmen Fail to Answer A Very Pointed Question.

COULD EASILY EVADE LAW

Bill of Sale Topped Off With Chattel Mortgage Would Put City in a Hole, They Say.

An animated meeting of the license committee of the city council was held last evening. The principal matter of business to come before it was the brewery-owned saloon question. There appeared before the committee managers of three breweries, Albert Fisher, Jacob Moritz, and W. P. Klse. Little progress was made in arriving at conclusions as to what was to be done in the premises.

The brewery men disclaimed being in the saloon business beyond the limits of the present ordinance. All admitted that they owned the fixtures in various saloons, the proprietorship of which did not pertain to them. This they said was necessary, as such rule had been adopted by outside breweries and local breweries had to follow the lead thus set.

Members of the committee suggested that they precise he discontinued Mr.

lead thus set.

Members of the committee suggested that the practise be discontinued, Mr. Fisher retorted by saying that the breweries could easily place themselves within the law by giving a bill of sale to the men running Saloons of all fixtures, and then turn around and take a chattel motigage on the same. What better off would the city be under such condition, he asked, and no member of the cummittee was able to answer the query. The matter was left to be threshed out later.

Attorneys of the Utah Light & Railway company were before the street committee to protest against the company being compelled to pay damages for a sprinkler demotished by a street car. It was contended that the accident was due to the carelessness of the driver, who attempted to cross the track immediately in front of the car, and the company offered to bring 14 witnesses to prove such assertion. If it could be shown that the company was responsible, a willingness was expressed by its representatives to pay the cost of repairs. The matter was postponed for two weeks, upon recommendation of Assistant City Attorney P. J. Daly. P. J. Daly.
