him right out." Phenic, or carbolic acid, noticed of late as a powerful disinfectant, has been found a most valuable remedy in certain diseases in sheep. Dr. Calvert, in a recent lecture says the cure of scab is effected by a single dip in water containing a small quantity of the acid.

For foot-rot, a mixture is made of the acid and a plaster, which is made to acid. three days, preventing the contact of side air. But if the flock be numerous, a shallow tray made of stone, is filled with the medicated mixture, and the sheep made to pass through it. Cattle cease to be annoyed with flies if washed with a very weak solution of this acid. Hides.


