Continuing, he says:

"This work, which would tax the best ability and energies of a force numerically strong enough to permit of giving it proper official attention at all points has been made doubly onerous because of the inadequate number of quartermusters now provided by law, and the greatly depleted civilian force in the quartermaster-general's office."

Gen. Humphrey strongly recommends some increase in his clerical force. The total cost of animals, wagons and harness purchased by the depart-ment during the past fiscal year is given at \$527,050. There were shipped to the Philippines 37,654,000 pounds of hay and 46,938,000 pounds of oats, while 21,246,192 oounds of native forage were purchased n the Philippines. During the year the Philippines. During the year treasportation was furnished, exclusive of army transport service for 829,-901 persons, 25,661 animals and 261,593 tons of freight. There were carried from San Francisco to the Philippines by the army transports 10,036, and from the Philippines to San Francisco 14,831

Gen. Humphrey says there has been expended during the fiscal year on account of the army transport service \$3,074,024. The value of the work performed by the army transports on basis of the lewest obtainable rates offored for the same service, he says, was \$3,472,260, or a difference in favor of the army transport service of \$398.

Thomas, a prominent lawyer of this city, and attorney for the Civic Federation, was badly wrecked by a bomb placed on the front porch at 2 o'clock this morning. Mr. Thomasand his family were in the house at the time and he considers it miraculous that none of them were injured.

Mrs. Thomas was awakened about 2 'clock by a noise on the front porch and aroused her husband, believing that burglars were trying to enter the house. Mr. Thomas began an investigation and discovered a fire on the front perch. He picked up a large rug and attempted to smother the flame, when a terrific explosion occurred. Although but a few feet from the missile he es-caped injury. The front wall of the house was blown in doors were shat-tered and an immense hole torn in the ground. The interior of the building

A squad of police were on the scene in a short time but no clue to the per-petrators of the deed could be found. The man evidently made a hasty escape after setting fire to the fuse which exploded the bomb. Mr. Thomas saw no one leaving the premises. The explo-sion was heard for three miles.

Atty. Thomas has been active for some time in the prosecution of saloon keepers charged with violation of the Slocum law, which provides for mid-night and Sunday closing of saloons. He has also been acting for the Civic Federation in the habeas corpus pro-ceedings by which Thomas Dennison has sought to avoid being taken to Iowa in connection with the \$75,000 Po lock diamond robbery. To these circumstances Mr. Thomas said to the Assoclated Press he attributed this attack on his home.

CERMANS MUCH PLEASED WITH PRESIDENT'S SPEECH

Berlin, Nov. 21.-President Roosevelt's speech at Washington Saturday on the occasion of the unveiling or the bronze statue of Frederick the Great, and the attendant ceremonies have pleased Ger-many. Reports of extraordinary lengths for the German press were ca-bled, including the speeches of the president and of Ambassador Sternberg. Leading articles expressing appreciation of Mr. Roosevell's utterances ap-pear in most of the newspapers today. The semi-official North German Gazette, which may be taken in this in-stance as representing general opinion

"In Germany the celebration, and particularly President Roosevelt's address, will leave a lasting impression. The profound insight with which the president as a historian did justice to the personality of the great king and general, and described his heroic and unwearled self-sacrifice for a great po-litical idea, fills us in Germany with warm sympathy. We fully understand the position that the president as a clear-minded statesman assigns to the United States in its political relation ship to the various European nations whose emigrants for three centuries have found a home beyond the ocean, and there have been blended into one indivisible whole, which as a thoroughindivisible whole, which as a thoroughly specific individual is making itself felt more and more on the world's stage. Our people and the American nation are really not rivals. On the other hand, they supplement each other in more than one salutary direction. If misunderstandings have occurred here and there it is satisfactory to record that the clouds which formerly obscured the good relations between the two great peoples have been dissipated."

New York, Nov. 21.-Gen. Louis Palma di Cesnola, director and trustee of the Metropolitan museum of art, died suddenly today from an attack of acute indigestion. He was 72 years old.

As a result of the blow Wackford died today at the Central Emergency hospital from fracture of the skull. His assallant, whose name is unknown, escaped. s unknown, escaped.

San Francisco, Nov. 22.—Frank Donahue, a teamster, has been arrested and his name entered on the detinue in connection with the death of Thomas Wackford, who died from the effects of a blow which it is alleged was inflicted by Donahue. Wackford accidentally stepped upon the skirts of a woman, who it turns out was Donahue's wife, and it is charged that in retaliation and it is charged that in retaliation Donahue struck him on the head, knocking him down, with fatal results.

PRESIDENT'S CABINET.

Atty. Gen Moody Will Remain As a Member.

Washington, Nov. 21.—Atty.-Gen. Moody has decided to remain in the cabinet. Prior to his transfer from the navy department to the department of justice, Mr. Moody himself authorized the statement that at the conclusion of the present administration he would retire from the cabination. retire from the cabinet to practise law in Boston. It was stated in this connection that Mr. Moody had formed a law partnership that was congenial and advantageous in all respects. This was given as his only reason for retiring from public life.

It was known for some time that the office of attorney-general of the United States was entirely to Mr. Moody's liking, and as it was also known that President Roosevelt desired that Mr. Moody should continue in the cabinet,

It is understood that the president and Mr. Moody are in perfect accord in their ideas as to the conduct of the department of justice, and in order to carry into effect certain plans which the president and he have formulated, Mr. Moody has decided, on the request

The decision of Atty-Gen. Moody renders it reasonably certain that the heads of six of the great executive departments of the government have been determined on by the president for the next administration. Cortel-you will be postmaster-general after the 4th of next March. It is expected also that Mr. Shaw will continue as secretary of the treasury and Mr. Mor-ton as secretary of the navy, but as to those two no definite information is ob-tainable. A change is expected in the department of the interior, but Secy. Hitchcock has not let it be known pub-licly whether he desires to retire or not.

The condition of the Tafalla when the crew of the Aros Castle last saw the vessel was such as to lead them to believe that the bank went down during the night.
