## SUNDAY SERVICES.

Elder Joseph E. Taylor of the Stake presidency presided over the services at the Tabernacie Sunday alternoon, Jabuary 10, 1897.

Elder George -Bowles, who returned Baturday from the Australasian mis-sion field, was introduced to the congregation as the first speaker, He stated that he had been absent from bome for a period of three years an eight months, during which time he eight months, during which time he had been promulgating the principle of the Gloepel. He had had joy and satisfaction in his labore and in addresing the Baints at home he brought greetings from the Maori people unto all the Church and its authorities from the greatest down to The Saints the least member thereof. in the valleys of the mountains were not forgotten by their dark-skinned brethren and sisters, as they often spoke of them and sometimes wished that they were privileged to gather that they were privileged to gather out to Zion and mingle with the great body of the Church. The speaker looked upon the Marries as be-ing a branch of the House of Israel, and although only about one-tenth of those people had embraced the Gospel, the outlook for a good work among them in the function work decivit. among them in the fu ure was decidly favorable.

The Elders laboling among the Maori people were being biessed ex-ceedingly of the Lord. They were bright in sequiring the language and had heen known to speak the stengue perfectly, after having been on the islands but eight weeks. This was a sufficient testimony to the Eiders that the Lord was blessing them, and knowing this they went forth trusting in Him and reaping the reward of faithfulness.

Elder Bowles had had to travel extensive y in the New Zesland country, bunting out the honest in heart and laying the Gospel nefore them. They were a people ecattered to the four wit de, as it were, being found living on the bilitops and in the valleys. They were an honest-hearted, hospitable people and the Elders received the best of treatment at their hands. Their tyes were jurned towards Zion and there was a yearning desire with-in them, that the time (would soon come when they woul be permitted to gather out from Babyion and participate in the bigher ordinances of the Gospel. The work in Australia was progressing nicely, and the great cry was that more ishorers would be sent into the field. The barvest was ripe and the laborers were few, hence the cry for more Elders to take up the ministerial labor.

In conclusion Elder Bowles testified to the truth of the Gospel. He knew It was the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ-the same Grapel that was to he established in the latter days, never more to be thrown down or given to abother people. the Lord and that God had directed the work of organizing His Church upon the earth in this dispensation.

The choir sang the anthem: From afar gracious LorJ.

Elder Goorge B. Spencer, a recent president of the Netherlands mission, was the next speaker. For two and s half years the speaker said be had inhored in the Netherlands, speaking to the people in the Dutch language. When he arrived in that field he found the work just commencing to take root. When he left to return home he noticed a wast improvement in the work being done, and was now in a position to state that the Netherlands mission was progressing on a par with any in the whole of Europe. The distribution of the Millennial Blar, published in the Dutch language, was an important factor in the spread of The the Gospel among the people. higher classes were being reached with the Gospel message and as a result the Elders were taking joy in their labors and were pressing forward in carrying out the dathes devolving upon them. Eider Snencer was greatly impressed with the fire and enthusiasm dwelling in the breast of the Saints abroad. They knew that the Saints abroad, They knew that the Gospel which they had esponsed was the true Gospel of Christ, and knowing this their desire was to press on and reap for themselves an exaita-tion in his kingdom. The speaker by request made a few remarks in the Dutch language.

Elder Heber J. Grant was the next speaker. It is always a source of great pleasure to me to listen to the testimonies of the Elders of Israe who have been to the nations of the esath presolving the Gospel. I refreshes my spirit, it renews my determination to press forward and t faithful in the discharge of the he duties and obligations that rest upon me as a servant of God. The testimo-nies that have been horne in our hearing today are worthy of the thoughtful consideration of each and every one of us. When we real'ze that a man who has traveled ten thousand miles from his home in one direction stands up and bears witness to the gills and graces of the Gospel, and then another stands up and bears testimony to the same gifts and graces who has traveled in another direction to New York and across the Atlantic ecsan, it seems to me that these testimonies that are borne of the knowledge which these young me possess of the divinity of the work in which we are engaged ought to make a profound impression upon the hearts of every Latter-day Saint. And I re-gret that it can be truthfully said-and I know it is true-that there is not the same fire, not the same devotion, na the same determination existing in the hearts of many of the Latter.day Saints dwelling in these mountains to labor for the onward advancement of the kingdom of God as can be found in those that have received the Gospel in

ceived the witness of the Holy Spirit, know for themselves that they are engaged in the work of God, and stand up and bear this testimony, and yet when they gather home to Zion they become mixed up in the affairs of the world, they set their hearts upon the things of this w rid, at d they forget that leati-mony. Why do they forget in? Be-cause they do not labor with that same energy, that same zeal and that seme determination for the advance. ment of the kingdom of God that they did when they first embraced the Gospel.

I desire to tear my testimony to this audience today that just in pro-portion as you and I labor and keep the commandments of God will we be blessed by the light and the inspirabe blessed by the light and the inspira-tion of the Spirit of Almighty God. I say that no young usan who returns from a mission and who has received the witness of the Holy Spirit and has seen the gifts and graces of the Gospel matifested, will ever loose that warmth, that fire and that determination to labor for the advancement of the kingdom of God so long as he is faithful in keeping the commandments of God. But I regret to say that there are many young Elders that stand up as these young brethren have done bere today and hear witness that they know that God lives, that the heavens have been opened, that Joseph Smith was a Prophet of God, and that the everlasting Gospel has again been restored to the earth-I say I regret to say that many of them after they return home discontinue their lab rs and forget to work for the advancement of that kingdom, and the Spirit of the Lord leaves them. I remember as well as though it were yesterday when this young brother (Elder Spencer) young brober (Elder Spencer) who has been speaking was set spart for a mission, I rememapart for a mission. I remem-ber distinctly that when we blessed him we blessed him that he shcuid have particular power, and that he should be abundantly blessed upon that mission. I remember the testimony of the Spirit that came to me while my bands were upon that young man's bead. I remember that I was ready and willing to predict that he would be successful and fulfill a mission that would be an honor to him and an honor to his father and mother and to the work of G d that he represented. remember standing with Brother John Henry Smith when he laid his hands upon a grandson of Heber C. Kimhall, and I remember the spirit and inspiration that dame upon him while he was blessing that boy. I do know that the light and the inspiration of the Spirit of God rests upon the men that labor for the onward advancement of the tingdom of God at home or abroad. I know that every man, woman and child among the Latterday Saints who keeps the commandments of God has burning in his or her beart a testimony of the divinity of this work. I know that every Latter-day Baint that lives upon the face of the earth who is keeping the commandments of God realizes and knows that the Prophet of God stands at the head of the work of God.
