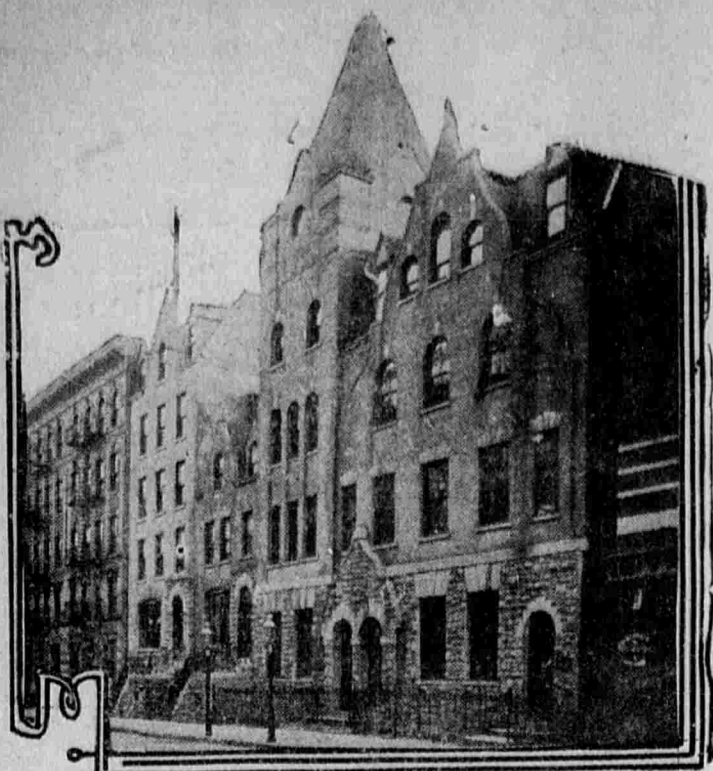


WORKING GIRLS' HOTEL.



The People's Tabernacle.

To provide suitable quarters for homeless girls in a large city has always been a difficult problem for the sociologist to solve.

One hotel, just opened in New York, the Emeline Yorke-Tyndall hotel, 88 east 102nd street, will not, it is said, have any of the objections that have been urged against some of its forerunners. "Lights out at 11 o'clock" will be the only rule enforced about the place, and masculine callers will be encouraged, with pretty parlors for their entertainment. The hotel, solely for working girls, is an adjunct of the People's Tabernacle, an interdenominational church, which stands right next door, and of which the Rev. H. M. Tyndall is pastor. But there is to be no religious atmosphere about the place, as it is said to be no religious atmosphere about the church.

The hotel was built almost wholly with his own hands by Mr. Tyndall. He has been more than two years at the work, and has produced a modern building. A girl will receive board and lodging at the hotel as low as \$2.50 a week. The erection of the hotel is not in any way a work of charity. Rather, it is one of benevolence on the part of the pastor, who believes much good can be done by giving shelter and comfort to a deserving class of workers.
