Word has just been received from Ouray to the effect that Orrin L. Curry, formerly Indian trader for the Ulntah Uncompangre Utes at Ouray and agency, committed suicide there today by shooting himself. Curry and W. C. Forsythe of White Rocks had gone to Ouray to see Lewis C. Curry, present ost trader and brother of the former, who has a trader's store at Ouray. While Lewig Curry and Forsythe were out of the store for a few moments, 'urry shot himself in the head, dying ilmost instantly.

Seventeen years ago he came from Kentucky and for a long time did all the merchandising business with all the Indian tribes there. Later he got to gambling, when his brother came out from Kentucky and took charge of the business, giving Orrin \$5,000 in cash and again \$3,000 besides taking a large amount of indebtedness and a rundown ousiness off his hands. Curry went from bad to worse all the time, and it is supposed he went to his brother for money, which was refused, who concluded to end it all by suicide. when he
