Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 32.5, 5.65 inches. Temperature at 6 a. m., 49 degrees; maximum, 67; minimum, 43; mean, 55, which is 6 degrees above normal. Excess of daily mean temperature since Oct. 1, 2.7 degrees. Deficiency of daily mean temperature since Jan. 1, 2.70 degrees. Precipitation since the first of the month, .89 inch, which is .62 inch below the normal. Deficiency in precipitation since Jan. 1, 1.08 inch.
