MAYOR GLASMAN
SUED FOR \$10,000.

District Attorney George Halver-
son Eaters Suit Against Stan-
dard for Libel.

SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL.

Miraculous Escape of Little Child—
Marriage of County Assessor Dix—
Other Weddings—News Briefs.

Ogden, June 27.—The preliminary steps to the filing of a big libel suit for \$10,000 damages by District Attorney George Halverson against Mayor William Glasman and the Standard Publishing Company were taken last evening, when summons were placed in the hands of Deputy Sheriff Sam Cave and served on Mr. Glasman personally and the Standard Publishing company, of which he is editor, and owner.

For some time past, unfriendly feelings have existed between the two gentlemen, and a number of articles have been published in the Ogden Standard and Morning Examiner damaging to Mr. Glasman's name and character, and as a consequence of these articles the suit is brought. A. E. Pratt appears on the summons as attorney for Mr. Halverson. When Mr. Reed got into the case, he was employed to assist in prosecuting the case, which promises to be very interesting before it is completed in the courts. The complaint has not yet been filed in the district court, but is being prepared and will be filed in a few days.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPE

Of a Little Child From Death in Thrilling Runaway.

Particulars have just come to light of a most thrilling runaway which occurred Saturday evening in the Ogden canyon. Mr. and Mrs. M. T. Reed, 28 Twenty-fourth street, drove up the canyon in the afternoon and soon after reaching Ogden valley Mr. Reed got out and went fishing along the river. Mrs. Reed drove up to the creamery and watered her horse at the trough. The little boy was in the buggy, asleep in a pillow. When Mrs. Reed started to put up the check rein the horse started to plunge. She endeavored to hold him and at the same time to take the little fellow out of the buggy. She was thrown down and kicked by the horse over the right eye, which was badly gashed. The woman clung desperately to the reins and the horse dragged her for over two blocks. Her head struck some obstacle and she was stunned and had to relinquish the reins. The horse dashed on at a great pace and the little boy, awakened by the jolting and the cries of his mother, jumped from the bottom of the buggy to the seat and hung there while the horse sped down the canyon. A young man at the Ririe residence saw the animal pass and, mounting a horse, dashed after it, bringing it to a halt. Mrs. Reed was later brought to Ogden and
