

## MINING, BUSINESS AND STOCKS

### FORENOON ON THE EXCHANGE.

Trading Was Not Very Brisk, but Some Stocks Appear in Better Tone.

### DAILY-JUDGE IN GOOD FORM.

Wabash Moves Up Again—Columbus Con. Continues at a Low Figure—Quotations and Sales.

The week opened with the sale of 4,800 shares of stocks on the floor of the Salt Lake Stock and Mining Exchange this forenoon. While the sales were light the market showed some good spots. Daily-Judge was in demand at better figures, but only 100 shares turned. This came out at \$6.75. Wabash, too, was in better tone and a small lot was taken at \$2.50. Silver Shield came out at 26 cents.

On the open board Columbus Consolidated was offered, but there were few buyers for it. While reports from the mine indicate are most encouraging the stock remains ridiculously low. But an advance is anticipated before very long.

#### PARK CITY MINES.

Management of Daily-Judge will start soon.

Exceptionally good and encouraging news comes from the Daily-Judge management to the effect that the mill will start up the first of the month and that 200 men will be put to work in the mine, says the Park Record. Manager Daly has not been up this week, but though the report has not been confirmed by him, it is well known that active steps toward the starting of the mill and the increasing of the mine force have been taken of late, and the news has been expected for some time. The work of prospecting, which has been going on for year or more past has put the mine in splendid condition for extensive development and when work is commenced a large amount will be taken out daily.

Those miners who visited the New York Bingham mine last night are certain that the mine is in better condition than ever. Work is being prosecuted on the 100-foot and 150-levels and are in considerable quantities and of excellent quality. It is being run on each of those levels. Monday next another shipment of about 10 tons of high grade will be shipped in sight to make work for some time.

With these shipments being made daily, stockholders need pay little attention to the fluctuations of the stock on the market, as the ore is there, and that is what counts. The stock, if the condition of the mine be considered, is worth \$3 or \$4 today.

The work of dismantling the old Marquette mill is progressing rapidly. Attention of Contractor Harwood, considerable boulders practically pure and in great amount of quicksilver is being taken out, making the work very profitable. The work of taking down the big brick stock, 100 feet high and erected in 1885, will begin in a short time.

Another shift was put on this week at the Ontario mill, where the tailings of the old dam are being worked. It is expected that the mill will be running on the mine product again in a short time.

## FEVER HAS HIT

### ELDORADO CAMP

Southern Nevada District is Enjoying a Right Lively Boom.

#### SEVERAL LARGE DEALS MADE.

Philadelphia Property Bonded for \$30,000—Los Angeles Syndicate Buys Townsite.

Eldorado canyon, north of Searchlight near the head of the Colorado river, is having its turn. According to late advices from that company new camp is having a right lively boom.

E. J. Roberts, manager of the Eldorado Mining & Milling company's property at Eldorado, who is now in the city, for a brief vacation, is in receipt of a letter from a business associate in which he states that since Mr. Roberts left camp several large deals in mining property have been consummated and that crises have gone up at a rapid rate during the past two weeks.

A Los Angeles syndicate has purchased the Eldorado townsite and the property next door, and is engaged in big improvements and incidentally will push the date of lots. One group, owned by a party by the name of Harrington, was sold a few days ago for \$8,000 cash. The Philadelphia group, another promising property, has been bonded for \$30,000. At Knob Hill a man by the name of Anderson, the writer states, is sacking some ore for shipment with general agents in charge of cash. This means that the Salt Lake Route is now out after business and will reflect, to quote one of the officials, "to beat the band."

An announcement was made today that M. Le Bel had been appointed general agent for the Salt Lake Route with a syndicate of 300,000 dollars. New York and George M. Sergeant had been named in a similar capacity with offices at 26 Clark street, Chicago.

Mr. Gemmill to Assist in Sampling Utah Copper Mine

R. C. Gemmill, the well known mining engineer, has arrived from Mexico where he went on a hurried business trip several weeks ago and the "News" learns from a reliable source that he has been engaged to assist in the final winding of the Utah Copper mine at Bingham in behalf of the American Securities Securities company, which holds an option on a large block of the stock.

There is considerable speculating being done in mining circles over the amount of stock actually involved in this option. Some say it covers a large part of the stock of the company, while others express the opinion that it does not quite reach 51 per cent, yet not very far from it.

There is a slight failing off in prices of fruits, including the juicy watermelon on this week, and the markets are well supplied. There is also a slight fall in cheese, meats and poultry wholesale. Eggs, veal, lamb, oranges, etc., are in full swing and the market is holding the position and find a ready demand. Raspberries are winding up, and dealers say that this will see the end of the season. Cherries are pretty near gone also. California tomatoes are being shipped in largely now from Southern California over the Salt Lake Route, and are taking the place of Texas tomatoes which are not panning out well. California peaches are arriving in good condition with plums and a few apples. Utah and Southern Nevada cucumbers are being received, also a few cantaloupes.
