# LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

A Sad Summons.—Hon. F. M. Lyman, Speaker of the House of Representatives, of the Legislature, left the City this morning for Tooele. We regret to learn that his return home is occasioned by the severe illness of one of his children, concerning which he received word last evening.

Theatre.—The highly amusing comedy "La Tentation," was played in most attractive style by the Lincolns and company last night. This evening "Stolen Kisses" will be presented. Those who fail to witness the performances of these artists will miss a genuine treat.

Calendar.—We have received, with the compliments of James H. Wallis, in charge of the printing department of the Bear Lake Democrat, the Democrat calendar for 1890. It is very well constructed, and of fair appearance. The chronological part of the calendar points to the various leading events in the history of the Church.

Missionary Returned.—We received a call this morning from Elder Z. P. Terry, returned missionary. He left Utah on the 15th of October, 1879, for England. In that country he labored in the Nottingham Conference, until last fall, when he came over to this side of the Atlantic. He remained in Pennsylvania about three months visiting relatives.

Lecture on India.—Last night Brother William Fotheringham, delivered his highly interesting lecture on India, to a large audience, in the 16th District School House, under the auspices of the ward M. A Young Composer.—Mr. Wm. Olive, a progressive young musician of this city, has composed an overture entitled "The Golden Cross," which was performed the last two evenings by Prof. Thomas' Theatre Orchestra. The rendition was received with applause. The performances of the orchestra have been a marked attraction of late at the Theatre, the audience frequently manifesting emphatic approval.

A Little Salt.—A gentleman called at our office to-day and asked us to suggest that if the Main Street merchants would have the liberality to sprinkle a quantity of salt over the sidewalk in front of their stores, many unseemly, involuntary acrobatic exhibitions on the part of pedestrians would be dispensed with. The merchants should see to it. It is now in order to state that the gentleman who offered this philanthropic suggestion is not in the salt business. He only desires to see the people maintaining perpendicular positions, instead of being compelled occasionally to assume shockingly undignified attitudes.

A "Coasting" Accident.—Last night while Mr. J. Saville was driving towards his home in the 18th Ward, in a light conveyance, three boys gliding down the hill on sleds, collided with the horse and buggy. The force of the collision was so great that Mr. Saville and a boy that was riding with him were thrown out. The former struck upon his head, but escaped without being seriously hurt. The lad rolled out upon the snow and was uninjured. One of the three boys on the sled, named Stevens, received some injury to his legs, but we did not learn the extent. The horse, being frightened, ran a couple of blocks. The conveyance was considerably smashed and the harness damaged.

Juvenile Monopoly.—Some of the boys in the northern part of the city carry water from the 20th Ward ditch and distribute it over the sloping sidewalks to make coasting slides. When they come down the hillside the ears of the patient pedestrians are saluted with a concentrated yell—"Clear the track." The meek afflicted citizen is driven to the dire necessity of climbing an adjoining fence, getting down into a water ditch or retreating into the snow, with the alternative of using a cork leg for the remainder of his earthly career. After narrowly escaping being smashed by a passing sled, the pursuer's course mainly considering as to whether he or any other man has any rights which a small boy on a sled is bound to respect.

Elders in Pennsylvania.—We have been enabled to peruse a couple of letters from Elder James K. Ingie, to brother L. John Nuttall, regarding his own and the labors of Elder William G. Brough, in Pennsylvania. They meet with a great deal of opposition, but it is overbalanced by encouragement. He gives some interesting details of a discussion that was held in Markleysburg, between Elder Ingie and a clergyman named Thomas, in response to a challenge of the latter. The sectarian was completely confounded. He proposed to show that the "Mormon" religion was a humbug. The rule was that each speaker was to occupy fifteen minutes alternately. The clergyman opened, but was so confused as to be unable to occupy more than four minutes, resuming his seat and saying that he could not think of anything to say. He made several attempts with a similar result in each instance. Brother Ingie had an excellent opportunity of preaching to the people, there being nothing in his opponent's remarks to reply to. Mr. Thomas finally admitted that he knew that two-thirds of what Elder Ingie had stated was true, and he was not sure but that the other third was the same quality. A paper called the Standard has a lengthy article regarding the presence and operations of the Elders in the locality. It says:

"It is no compliance to a community to see a school-house full of scholars, while a Mormon missionary preaches, while an orthodox prayer meeting, a hundred yards distant, is postponed for want of members."

It advocates strong measures against the Elders, saying:

"We would say to the school boards in the townships in which these men have been, be prompt in your duty, and close the school houses against them."

Elder Ingie and Brough are the brethren whose presence in Pennsylvania was mentioned in the dispatches a few days ago.

The work, which was done in Europe, is exquisite, and the pictures are beautiful. They are also just the thing for people here to send to their friends at a distance. The views number nineteen. The first is a general view of Salt Lake City, and following in order are other views of East Temple St., the Temple Block, the Salt Lake Assembly Hall, Design of the Temple, Z. C. M. L., Deseret National Bank, Walker House, Continental Hotel, City Hall, Theatre, Methodist Church, Saint Paul's Episcopal Chapel, Residence of the late President Brigham Young, showing the Lion House, church offices; Beehive House and Eagle Gate; the Garden House, Mayor Little's Residence, St. Mark's School, the Presbyterian Church and Great Salt Lake, giving a view of Black Rock looking west.

The pictures are accompanied by a pen description of Salt Lake City. Doubtless many of these albums will be carried away by tourists and other stranger visitors. The album, which formerly sold at 75c, is reduced to 50c. An advertisement about it appears in our columns.

A Terrible Accident.—Last night Hon. Moses Thatcher and Hon. W. B. Preston received dispatches from George W. Thatcher Esq., conveying the startling intelligence that Mrs. Rachel Thatcher, wife of Brother John B. Thatcher, was accidentally killed about 10 a. m. yesterday. The distressing event occurred in Gentile Valley, on a ranch of which the husband of the unfortunate lady is part proprietor, and on which he had recently gone to live.

The news received last night indicated that the accident occurred through the falling in of the kitchen of the house, which is comparatively new and constructed of logs. It is probable the roof gave way under the pressure of a heavy accumulation of snow.

The body of Mrs. Thatcher was conveyed to Logan, and Brother M. Thatcher and W. B. Preston left for that place this morning, for the purpose of being present at the funeral, which is expected to take place to-morrow.

The deceased lady was the eldest daughter of Bro. Nathan Davis, of the firm of Davis, Howe & Co., of this city, and was highly esteemed for many estimable qualities. The bereaved husband and other relatives have the sincere sympathy of the community.

Conjoint Meeting.—On Monday evening, there was a conjoint meeting of the Mutual Improvement Associations of the 16th, 18th, 17th and 19th Wards, in the 16th District School-house. The programme consisted of selections from those furnished by the several wards, comprising short theological lectures, quatrains, glees, essays, readings and recitations. Brothers Joseph H. Felt and Geo. O. Lambert, of the Stake Association superintendency, were present and took part in the proceedings. The house was crowded on the occasion, and the affair was very satisfactory throughout. It is the desire of Brothers Felt and Lambert that other sections of the city should consolidate and follow suit, as such gatherings have a good effect.
