Some of smaller land crabs do great service in renewing the soil by continually rowing, doing work performed elsewhere

by earthworms.

A study of scurvy, in Russian prov-inces where it has been epidemic for many years, leads Prof. A. M. Levin to conclude that it is a chronic form of chicken cholera. The same bacteria appeared in both diseases.

The causes of the deflection of a projectile as it leaves the gun is the inter-esting and important study which Profs. Cranz and Koch have begun. The experiments thus far have been made with an ordinary rifle, and the method has consisted in throwing a beam of light from a bright spot on the barrel upon a rapidly moving sensitive film, the vibrations of a tuning fork being photographed at the same time for comparison. The position of the re-flecting spot and the size of the powder charges are systematically variegun reaches its greatest vibration af-ter the ball has left it, but motion beis distinctly recorded, and is especially marked with reduced charges. The true theory is yet to be worked out. Release of the barrel from the weight of the projectile, waves of heat causing unequal expansion, and the thrust of the gas ring against the rifling, are among the suggested causes of the vibration but the real explanation will doubtless be found in a combination of several forces. The investigation will be continued with larger guns.

A curlous test for deafness has been brought before the Paris Academy of Medicine by Dr. Bonnier. On applying tuning-fork to the knee or other part of the bony structure, nothing is heard by the sound ear, but the note is distinctly audible to an ear in which disease has begun.

The sanitary committee is exerting

every possible effort to stop the spread of the disease. Dr. Condon, city physician, was seen last evening by the "News" representative and asked toncerning the situation, and he said that every case of smallpox in the city is getting along well, and that there have been but few developments during the past three weeks. With re-sard to the charge that the sanitary committee had not done their duty, he says they have, and every precaution is being taken for the welfare of the During the past twentyfour hours he has driven three different horses down chasing up rumors about cases, and that not a rumor had been found to be true. A problem that may mean much to A problem that may mean much to rural districts is receiving attention near Paris. A pair of trolley wires has been stretched along the highway for half a mile, and a double trolley driven by a little motor along these wires car-ries a cable-25 or 30 feet long-conducting current to the motor of an automobile. The length of the cable per-mits the carriage to run on either side of the road, turning out as may be nec-essary. It is predicted that trolley-fed carriages will become valuable extenslons of railway systems, and that the wires will also provide farmers with a source of needed power for agricul-tural work.

Cutting the hair close to the head in small patches on several persons, T.Pohl has carefully measured the subsequent growth and made other interesting observations. The cutting checked the growth for a month, when it returned growth rowal. The average rate of growth proved to be 2-5 to a little more than ½inch a month in boys 11 to 17 years of age; 3-5 inch at 21 to 25 years; and a little over 2-5 inch at 60. In a number of incera caling the number of insane patients the rate was less. A curious discovery was that each 2 to 4 hairs form a distinct group, in which one takes the lead in growth for a time, then the second, and so on in continuous rotation; and that the hairs reach a regular life limit, and fail out, in similar succession in each group. The same singular phenomena were found in the hair on the back of the fingers. The life period of a hair is 2 to 6 years, in which time it grows 20 to 40 inches, the most rapid growth being in the middle of the period.

The production of direct positives, by the simple method of J. E. Thornton and C. F. S. Rothwell, is held to be an im-portant advance in photography.
