WASHINGTON.

Gov. Bullock an Absentee.

WASHINGTON, 12.—The Georgia Journal, commenting freely on the fact that Governor Bullock has been absent from the State for over two months. As there is no Lieutenant Governor, the duties of the office in his absence have devolved first upon the President of the Senate and next upon the Speaker of the House. The last heard from Governor Bullock was on the 9th inst., when he was at San Francisco.

NEW YORK.

General Items.

NEW YORK, 12.—The audience in the Supreme Court to-day to witness the proceedings in the Foley suit, was much less than yesterday. On the opening of court the corporation counsel, O'Gorman, commenced reading affidavits which have been already published, bearing upon the cases of the defendants.

The police thus far have failed to discover a clue to the theft from the comptroller's office.

Comptroller Connolly has written a letter to Mayor Hall, in reply to the latter's request for him to resign. He declines to accede to the request, which he says has been made several times recently, and has had his careful consideration. He says he, in common with other city officials, is now on trial for malfeasance in office, and his answer to the charge is before the public and his complete defense is ready to be presented. He does not fear the result, but desires a speedy trial.

A meeting of Irish workmen last night applauded an address in denunciation of the Tammany leaders. O'Donovan Rossa, in a short address, regretted that Irishmen were led by Tammany Hall. The members of the "ring" were referred to in bitter language. Mayor Hall was spoken of as a "know nothing" and a "juggler."

District Attorney Morris, of Brooklyn, says if the president and officers of the State Labor Union are not brought to trial for the Westfield disaster, by the New York authorities, he will have within the next two months.

The Times says it is now, as the authority of the Hon. Robert N. Roosevelt, Democratic member of Congress for the fourth district of this city, that the debt of New York is not less than two hundred millions, or more than eighteen and a half per cent. of the assessed valuation of the real estate, which is the only part that can be counted on to pay the debt.

The enormous burden, more than one hundred and sixty-three millions, or over four-fifths, have been added since January 1st, '69, under the administration of the "ring."

Comptroller Connolly, in his reply to Mayor Hall's demand for his resignation, says that it seems to him his resignation at this particular time would give the advocates of the partisan attacks on the city government, just cause to believe him to be guilty, not only of participation in burglary in his office, but to all the charges now made in the legal proceedings. He says: "My official acts have been supervised and approved by your superior vigilance. So far as my administration is concerned, I accept full responsibility as to the result."

In the city injunction case to-day after O'Gorman had read the several affidavits, he closed, saying that while the papers had been presented, replying in the negative to a question by Judge Barrett, counsel for the prosecution, whether he would read Connolly's affidavit. Black then, in behalf of Connolly, read the latter's affidavit, saying that the want of time had prevented his preparing a final answer, and this, Judge Barrett inquired whether there were any other affidavits to be read. Barrett, in behalf of Tweed, said on examining the papers he found the order merely commanded him to do certain things, which he had already performed, and it therefore was of no force. Tweed was prepared to deny the charge of wrong-doing made against him in any portion of the papers, and was ready to do so on Wednesday morning. After a long discussion the order of argument in the case was agreed upon and the court adjourned.

The Municipal Troubles.

At a meeting this afternoon of the joint committee of citizens, aldermen and supervisors, on the city accounts, it was ascertained that no statement of accounts had been submitted to them. A committee then went to see the comptroller, who was not in his office. The chairman of the committee of citizens then handed in a lot of documents which they required, including the comptroller's annual accounts from '69 to '70, the report of the sinking and trust fund operations for '69, and a statement of the city debt to August '71. It is said Connolly has formed an alliance with Tweed to combat the other two members of the board. The mayor was recently barred for his action in the Connolly case, by many hangers-on about the City Hall and Court House.

MAINE.

Electoral news.

AUGUSTA, 12.—The indications derived from careful footings of the returns received up till noon to-day, are that Gov. Fernald's majority will be nearly 11,000. His opponent, Mr. May, last year, was 5,000.

MARYLAND.

Republican Convention.

BALTIMORE, 12.—The Republican State convention for the nomination of candidates for Governor and State officers, met here to-day. All the counties except Talbot, were represented, and among the delegates were twenty colored men. Hon. James Towne, of Cecil, was by acclamation nominated for Governor. Alexander Randall, of Annapolis, Attorney General, and Lawrence J. Bringle, of Frederick for Comptroller. Resolutions

were adopted sustaining the administration, commending the faithful execution of the laws, the general honesty and efficiency of the public service, the rapid decrease of debt and taxation, and recommending the re-nomination of President Grant. A resolution favoring the annexation of San Domingo was tabled by 56 to 467.

PENNSYLVANIA.

LONDON, 12.—The journals of to-day discuss the success of Chinese labor in America, in its relation to the recent strikes in England. The newspapers also comment savagely upon the many disasters which have recently befallen British ships of war. The victory of the Ward crew, in the Maratona Regatta, is also a general topic of remark.

Colonel Rowland, the accredited American agent to assist emigration, has arrived here and goes first to Scandinavia and Germany.

The American ship Lovell, from Hamburg, has arrived at Cardiff, with four of the crew dead from cholera.

The French and Swiss governments will be represented at the Mont Cenis tunnel opening.

BRUSSELS, 12.—The machine shops in this city have been closed by the proprietors. The strikers are now parading the streets. No disturbances have occurred.
