## STOCKTON HAS SETTLED TROUBLES

Is Building a Series of Settling Ponds Below Its Concentrating Mill.

### PLANT WILL START IN AUGUST

**Difficulties Over Disposition of Tailings Is Ended—Mine Development Progresses.**

The Stockton Gold Mining company, operating at Stockton, has overcome the difficulties which necessitated the recent closing down of its concentrating mill. The question appearing for a solution was that of the disposition of the tailings from the mill. A neighbor set up the claim that some annoyance had been experienced by him because of the muddy water running across his premises and depositing suds on the way.

Through an agreement entered into yesterday between the company and the complainant, the former has secured perpetual rights in the canyon. But to make it certain that no further trouble can occur, Manager Treanam is having constructed a series of retaining or settling ponds. In this manner none of the suds will be allowed to escape. Manager Treanam says it will probably take all the first of next month to complete the arrangement of these ponds, when the mill will go into commission again.

The development of the mine continues in a most encouraging manner and with the troubles which have caused the shutting down of the mill, settled, the company ought soon to be making money again.

### FORENOON ON EXCHANGE.

**American Flag and Columbus Con. sold On Open Board.**

While trading was decided dull on the floor of the mining exchange this morning, enough of the high priced stocks participated to bring up a fair average.
