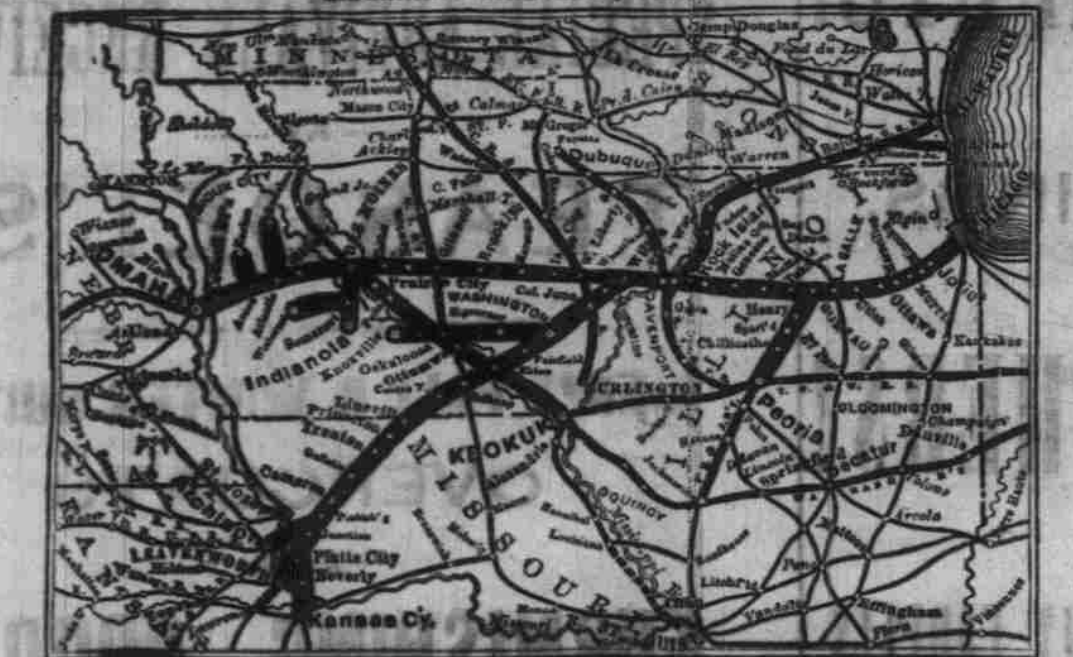

EASTERN ARIZONA STAKE CONFERENCE.

Quarterly Conference of the Eastern Arizona Stake of Zion, held in Snowflake, commencing Saturday, 10 a.m., September 27th, 1879.
