EASTERN DISPATCHES.

BALTIMORE, 14.—Late yesterday afternoon Magee was again arrested on a bench after his release from confinement, as was also Joe Coburn, at the instigation of Pinkney, State's attorney, charging Magee and Coburn with entering into a conspiracy in Maryland to engage in a fight, and thus violate the peace and laws of the adjoining State of Virginia. Upon this charge, which seemed to take the pugilists greatly by surprise, the accused were held in \$2,000 bail, to await the action of a grand jury. A similar warrant was also issued for O'Baldwin and his trainer, who were arrested this morning and gave the required bail. A large number of roughs from New York, Philadelphia, and other cities are here, and a number are now going down the street to the wharves where the steamers are which leave for the fighting ground this afternoon. The tug *Eldora* with several press reporters and amateurs of the prize ring leaves at three o'clock this afternoon. The indications are that the fight will come off tomorrow morning.

Later.—After the steamers had got steam up this afternoon, and a number of passengers were on board, notice from Pinckney, deputy U. S. attorney, was served upon the agents of the steamer to the effect that the owners would be held responsible for aiding and furthering a prize fight, in violation of the laws of the State, and the owners would especially brought to the notice of a grand jury. The agents consulted with their attorneys and ordered the steamer withdrawn, and forbade its departure. The fight is off for to-morrow in Virginia. McMullen, of Philadelphia, the stockholder, will appoint the time and place for the "match" within a week. The parties leave here tonight. It is hinted the fight may come off early to-morrow morning, on the Pennsylvania and Maryland line.

NEW YORK, 14.—Germany and the organizations acting in concert, met yesterday and appointed a committee of twenty-one to arrange for a mass meeting to endorse the nominees of the Baltimore Convention, on the 12th of September.

Hugh Hogan and William Wilson are sentenced to twenty years to State's prison for the outrageous robbery of Mrs. Hardy, in Broad street, in July. Nelson Wilson, an accomplice, was given five years' imprisonment. Mrs. Hardy was gagged and tied in her own home, and her husband, Hugh Hogan, when the thieves were about to apply a torch to her feet when she told where her jewelry and other valuables were secreted.

BOSTON, 14.—A terrific thunderstorm passed over Amesbury yesterday afternoon. The lightning struck five places, one was the house of the poet Whittier, prostrating him to the floor, but not seriously injuring him, nor was the house much damaged.

LONDON, 14.—An enormous business failure is developed here involving one of the most prominent business men in the city, Robert Atwood, insurance agent and a member of a pork packing firm. He has been heavily speculating in cotton and stocks, and became involved to the extent of a quarter of a million. He left on the train this afternoon, was arrested, and brought back. At 11 o'clock to-night he was bailed in \$50,000 to appear before the police court tomorrow. It is charged that he has obtained large amounts from banks, on fraudulent drafts, and on paper to which he forged the name of Dr. Lewis Rogers, his father-in-law, and other prominent citizens. Nearly every bank is a loser. Atwood is most highly connected and the affair is creating a profound sensation.

WESTERN PATCHES.

SAN DIEGO, 14.—Lieutenant Leroy, a captain one of the Oregon Steam Navigation Company's crews, entered a hotel kept by Bill Long, Chinaman, took dinner and refined pay.

The Chinaman insisted on payment, and after a general discussion of any circumstances, Leroy hit, not a pistol and made a general appearance. The Chinaman drew his pistol and breaking Leroy's head. Leroy coolly changed his pistol to the left hand and drew two pistol shots, which he received one in the stomach, which proved mortal.

A large and enthusiastic Greeley and Brown mass meeting is being held this
