The today's announcement of a fur-ther drop in the price of silver to 47%, making a decline of half a cent since vosterday, is having a decidedly depres-sing effect, and is generally being talk-ed of on the street today to the excluion of other kindred subjects.

Heretofore the silver extraction from ores of the lead-silver-copper bases, has about paid the cost of the production of the other metals, thus accounting for many of the profits from which divi-dends have been paid. The present rapid decline of the silver market, however, is giving rise to growing specu-lation as to how long, at the present ratio of decline, many of the properties will continue production.

TARIFF REVISION HEARING.

Washington, Dec. 1,-Today's hearing on the proposed tariff revision formed one of the most important of the cuire series held by the house ways and means committee. Cotton manufactures and silks and silk goods were the tow important schedules taken up. Large delegations of manufacturers from cotton manufacturing centers were on hand to present their views. An important gathering of representatives of the soap industry was held in Washington last night. It is esti-mated that 86 per cent of the soap manufacturers in the United States. having an aggregate of over \$75,000,000

of capital, were represented. Many arguments were advanced and ommittees were appointed to prepare briefs to be filed with the ways and means committee, stating that the tariff on tallow is unjust and has not been

effective as a revenue producer. Among the other articles on which the soap men claim there should be no duty are cocoanut oil, alkalis, soda ash and caustic soda.
