Undoubtedly the "big Milwkaukee blennial"-otherwise known as the fifth convention of the General Federation of Women's clubs-will be the most nota-ble assemblage of women ever held in the United States. The elaborate plans are in support of this prophecy.

The program, which is just complet-ed, is brilliant with the names of foremost American women. The sessionsfirst week in June-have been arranged by specialists on the practical work of the federation, such as the industrial condition of women and children, art in the schoolroom and in the municipalhome industries, domestic science, ics and education. The speakers on lvics and education. these subjects number fifty.

In the surprisingly short time of ten years the federation has grown to a membership of 2,500 clubs, numbering over 150,000 women. These figures are from official statistics of six months ago, and without doubt the ante-blennial scramble to get into the official fold has increased this number consider-ably. These 2,500 clubs are found al ably. These 2,600 clubs are found the way from the metropolis to the mountain town, and represent every State in the Union. The majority of them will send at least one delegate to the convention so that with the hundreds of club women who will go on their own hook there will be no less than 5,000 club women in attendance with their most scintillating "say." Coupled with this tremendous growth of the foderation has growth

of the federation has sprung up in the past two years the much-mooted ques-tion of reorganization. As the country is divided on the issue, the discussions give promise of marked animation. fact, the convention is for this reason looked upon by the leaders as an im portant turning point in the life of the

federation. The president, Mrs. Rebecca Lowe of Atlanta, notwithstanding the recent death of her husband, will preside over the convention. The success of this great gathering she will share with Mrs. Edward L. Buchwalter of Spring-Ars. Edward L. Euchwarter of spring-field. Ohlo, who as chairman of the program committee has speni months in its consummation. Another woman conspicuously connected with the pro-gram is Mrs. Herman Hall of Chicago, chairman of the art committee the hole. gram is Mrs. Herman Hall of Chicago, chairman of the art committee, who has been given the unprecedented allowance of three sessions. These three women will share honors with Mrs. James Sid-ney Peck of Milwaukee, the hostess of the convention city, who has supervised a lavish list of social pleasures on the side.
