Helena, Mont., Aug. 12.—Antone Korzeff, the deputy sheriff shot by Isaac Gravelle, the Northern Pacific dynamiter, who escaped from the county jail yesterday afternoon, died this afternoon. The dead officer had a wife and three children.

SAMUEL GATY SENTENCED.

To Reformatory for Stealing Though He Had Good Income. New York, Aug. 12.—Samuel Gaty, 24 years old, who has an income of \$3,000 a year, has been sentenced to a term in the Elmira reformatory.

Captain Jumped Into the Sea.

San Francisco, Aug. 12.—The ship Spartan arrived from Puget Sound today, reporting that her master, Capt. K. Fjerer, had jumped overboard on Aug. 5. He was taken out of the water unconscious and died within an hour.

Indignant Over the Ryushitetsu.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 13.—Indignation is expressed by the morning papers over the Ryushitetsu affair at Chefoo. They declare it to have been a more obvious breach of neutrality laws than the battle of Chemung at the beginning of the war.

CABINET DISCUSSES TURKISH QUESTION

Terms Offered Minister Leishman Seem to Be Quite Satisfactory.

TURKEY'S SINCERITY DOUBTED.

European Squadron Held Subject to Order of American Minister At Constantinople.

Washington, Aug. 12.—Foreign affairs, to the practical exclusion of everything else, were considered at today's meeting of the cabinet. The Turkish situation was discussed at length and a line of action in case Mr. Leishman's efforts are unavailing was agreed to, but its nature was not disclosed.

Constantinople, Friday, Aug. 12.—Minister Leishman today saw Tewfik Pasha, Turkish minister of foreign affairs, and renewed the urgent representations of the American government for an immediate settlement of the demands regarding the rights of American citizens in Turkey.

A Crisis Imminent.

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Summary Justice in Mexico.

El Paso, Tex., Aug. 12.—The Mexican officials are making out summary justice to the men who have been murdering American prospectors in Sonora. Munoz, one of the murderers who was sentenced to be shot, has been taken to the scene of his crime.

Heavy Forest Fires Rage.

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 12.—A long-distance telephone message says a heavy forest fire is raging near South Prairie, threatening the mill of the Airline Lumber company.

Wants Parker to Speak.

New York, Aug. 12.—Henry B. Hayes, member of the Democratic national committee from Missouri, is going to Esopus tomorrow and will make an urgent request that Judge Parker go to St. Louis and deliver a speech in the coliseum.

Dead of Ptomaine Poisoning.

San Pedro, Cal., Aug. 12.—Mrs. Nathan Caplan and her daughter, Mrs. George Monzes, have died from the effects of ptomaine poisoning, making a total of three deaths in one family from the same cause in the past three days.

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RUSSIANS LOSE ANOTHER WARSHIP

Every Reason to Believe That the Czarewitch Was Sunk August 10.

SEA FIGHT OFF PORT ARTHUR.

Czar's Fleet Attacked South of Ventao Island, and Escaped During the Night.

Tokio, Aug. 12.—Admiral Togo reports that the Russian battleship Czarewitch probably was sunk on Aug. 10, lifebuoys and other articles belonging to the vessel having been picked up at sea.

The navy department tonight issued a brief statement on the engagement with the Russian Port Arthur squadron on Aug. 10. The statement follows: "According to reports received to date the enemy's fleet which emerged from Port Arthur was attacked by our fleet south of Ventao Island."

The casualties in the Japanese navy on Wednesday, Aug. 10, numbered 170. A revised list of casualties on the Japanese side from the battle of Ching Jiu, March 28, up to and including the battle of Yangtze Aug. 1, has just been received, which shows the total estimated casualties to be 12,055.

Killed—Officers, 54 men, 1,509. Wounded—Officers, 96; men, 6,330. Estimated casualties for some of the engagements, amounting to 4,066, bring the grand total up to 12,055.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT.

Chairman Cortelyou Says He Will Make no Speeches.

New York, Aug. 12.—Chairman Cortelyou said today that President Roosevelt would not make any political speeches this year, setting at rest many rumors to the effect which have been in circulation. Beyond the speech to the notification committee and the letter of acceptance which is yet to be published the president will not take any public part in the campaign.

BRYAN LOSES.

He Will Get no Part of Bennett's \$50,000.

New Haven, Conn., Aug. 12.—A decision adverse to W. J. Bryan in his contest over the will of the late P. S. Bennett of New York and this city was handed down today by the supreme court of errors. The decision virtually denies that Mr. Bryan is entitled to the \$50,000 mentioned in the will.

Buenos Ayres, Aug. 12.—A number of Paraguayans have been killed or wounded in a combat between a revolutionary vessel and a steamer commanded by the government.

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
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
