LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

The lady is better known to many as "Dora Darnmoore," and is a correspondent of the *Daily Mercury* of San Jose, California. We bid her a hearty welcome.

Decoration Day.—The subject of a general holiday, and the suspension of business on Monday next (Decoration Day), is being agitated. Among those establishments which have decided to close doors, are the following: Z. C. M. I., Walker Brothers, S. P. Tinsdel, F. Auerbach and Brother, Kimball and Lawrence, G. W. Davis, Cohn Brothers, Barnes and Davis, G. F. Culmer, Little and Roundy, J. D. Farmer.

Burglary.—A burglary was committed last night on the store known as "Zion's Bazaar," kept by Mr. R. S. Waldron, just beneath Crow & Bowring's harness shop. The thieves went through a back window, cutting out two lights and a portion of the sash to effect an entrance, and made their exit through the back door. Mr. Waldron, on reaching the store this morning, discovered the following named articles missing: One hunting case silver watch, one hunting case white metal watch, three hunting case oriole watches, one luminous centennial watch, one centennial watch, one luminous imitation centennial watch, one black dial imitation centennial watch. Nine moss agate rings, nine fancy rings, nine gold band rings, six or eight napkin rings, five ladies' sets numbered several 876, 881, 847, 831, 855; three pairs of ear drops, two or three good shawl pins, one gray Chenille shawl and three striped shawls. Besides these things, about \$14 or \$15 in silver, nickels, dimes, quarters and halves, were taken from the till. The proprietor was at the store until 10 o'clock last night, and when he went down about half past 6 this morning, he found the window cut, the back door unbolting, and the money drawer, containing a solitary nickel, lying on the floor. The burglars are supposed to have had a boy to enter the place, while they remained outside, as the opening made was only large enough to admit a boy or a very slender man. No suspicions are entertained as to the identity of the culprits, but it is evident they were parties well acquainted with the premises.

A Fruitful Mission.

Elder George Batt and his company of 27 Saints, from New Zealand, whose names appeared in yesterday's News, arrived last evening as expected, several hours in advance, and one in Farmington, but the main body came on to Salt Lake, and with Elder Batt, called at our office this morning. All were well and in good spirits. We extend them a hearty greeting. A brief account of Elder Batt's mission, which has been unusually interesting and successful, will be perused with pleasure by the Saints. We glean the facts from his own modestly written report. He was called to New Zealand on the 7th of October, 1878, and left here on the 22nd with a party of missionaries for Europe, having received permission from President John Taylor to go via Liverpool, for the purpose of visiting friends in England. Arriving at New York on the 27th, they were detained until the 5th of November, when passage was secured on board the steamship *Weymouth*. After a somewhat rough and dangerous passage over a fierce sea, during which some parts of the vessel caught fire twice, they landed in Liverpool on the 16th, where they were warmly welcomed by President Wm. Budge and his associates. Up to the 11th of December, he was visiting relatives in his native village in Hants (Houghton), distributing tracts and endeavoring to disseminate the principles of truth. Since his visit there, one of his sisters has embraced the gospel and gathered to Zion, and he has strong hopes that others will do likewise. He next went to London to see two of his brothers, and to take passage for Australia. Not having sufficient money to pay his fare, he was obliged to work his way to his destination on board the steamship *Somersetshire*, and paid £5 for the privilege. This was a very unpleasant experience, as he had no company, was forced to sleep on deck for 59 days, could not put off his clothing, and had to endure all kinds of insults from the passengers and officers who were disposed to treat him more like a dog than a human being. Finally reaching Melbourne, Australia, he presented the Book of Mormon and Key to Theology to the Public Library of that city, and prepared to start for New Zealand on the 19th of February, 1879. In order to procure passage money, he was forced to sell his overcoat, satchel, bedding, &c. Arriving at Lyttelton, New Zealand, per S. S. *Tararua* on the 27th, he was met by Elder Pearce, who had charge of the mission, and immediately commenced his labors of preaching the gospel in that land. When Elder Pearce left for home on the 3rd of March, 1880, Elder Batt succeeded him as President of the mission, in which position he remained until the arrival of Elder Wm. M. Bromley, who took charge on the 18th of January, 1881. He was appointed (not released) by President Bromley on the 20th of April to bring home the company with which he reached here in safety. They left Auckland on the same date per S. S. *City of Sydney*, enjoyed a favorable trip, and landed in San Francisco on the 18th inst., resuming their eastward journey on the following day, they arrived in this city last evening at half-past six o'clock. As can easily be surmised, although Brother Batt has modestly withheld many details of his travels and labors, he has had an eventful mission, and has faithfully labored in the cause of truth, with what results the following will show: Number of miles travelled, 35,000; public meetings held, 312; baptisms, 75; re-baptisms, 10; confirmations, 68; ordinations to the Priesthood, 20 Elders, 20 Priests, 3 Teachers and 4 Deacons; children blessed, 22. His report concludes with these words: "I feel very thankful to the Lord for His much kindness to me, for under all circumstances He has been my helper. In the midst of severe mobbing, privations and a changeable climate, I have enjoyed the very best of health, which I owe to strictly keeping the Word of Wisdom. I have erred, I have the satisfaction of knowing that I tried to do right. And if I have accomplished any good, the praise belongs to Him I desire to serve forever."

The Strategists.

—There was a general expression of regret, among those who attended the Theatre last evening, that the entertainment was not witnessed by a bigger audience, for though by no means attenuated, it could, and should have been much larger. "The Strategists" is not only one of the most amusing comedies ever put upon the stage, but unlike the most of such extravaganzas, possesses genuine literary merit. It flashes with wit and bubbles over with humor, and though partaking largely of the inconsistent and improbable, as in the case of *opera bouffe* and other burlesque performances, it is certainly the quintessence of fun and frolic, and to anything of a higher order it makes no pretensions. It is a society extravaganza. In this light, the merit of the piece is only equalled by the artistic manner in which it is presented. Mr. J. B. Polk, who, by the way, is the original "George Washington Phillips" of the "Banker's Daughter," has the leading part, and as "Jack Rutledge" is well high perfect. His successive impersonations of his own father and the father of his sweetheart, were immensely comical, and the ridiculous situations in which his stage place proclivities continually place him, are enough to make an audience expire or perspire at least—while laughing. The other characters were all well portrayed, especially "Nellie Howard," "Major Howard," "Arthur Rutledge," "Misses of the Firm" and "Arminia," though none could be called anything but good. Miss G. Lee is one of the best comedienne we have ever seen. To-night this laughable comedy will be repeated, and should be witnessed by a crowded house.
