



CAPTURE 3,000 SPANIARDS

Desperate Condition of the Spanish Forces at Manila—Have Been 36 Hours Without Food.

Spanish Commander Wanted to Surrender to Americans to Avoid a Massacre, but the Archbishop Overruled Him—Spanish Boats Sent Out for Food Fail to Effect a Landing.

American Marines and Infantry Completely Mean in the City—Assaults on the Town—They Have Taken 3,000 Prisoners, Including 2,000 Officers—Two Generals and Other High Officers Hit Battle—Captured All Vessels—Have Fired on the Spaniards—The Spanish Have Fired, Wounded and Killed to the Death—Americans Cut the Bands in Twenty-four Hours—All Spanish Craft Gutted or Burned.

Seattle, June 13.—The Belligerents, June 12.—It is now officially admitted here that the loss of the Spanish fleet was about 3,000 men, a severe battle having been fought between the two sides. The Americans had about 1,000 men killed and 1,000 wounded, while the Spanish lost about 1,000 men.

This day it is announced to General Miles, commanding the American forces, that the Spanish have surrendered.

The survivors of the garrison are said to be 1,000 men, and Miles has ordered that they be sent to the United States.

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ANNEXATION NOW ASSURED.

Administration is Preparing for the Ceremony of Final Transfer.

President Due to be the First Governor—Admiral Miles Will Name the Flag over Hawaii.

New York, June 13.—A special to the Press from Washington says:

Annexation within the next two weeks is now considered so certain that the administration is finalizing plans for formally taking possession of the islands and raising the American flag over them.

This day is to be entrusted to Gen. Miles, commanding the Asiatic Division, and commanding both its military and naval forces, to be present at the ceremony of final transfer.

What the administration commands with the greatest confidence is that the government of Hawaii will be given up by the annexation authorities, and that the American flag will be raised over the islands.
