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ing bitterness until the close, General Harrison's cabinet remained in office, at the request of Mr. Tyler. The first duty devolving on the Whig

party was to give the relief promised by some financial measure, and a bill by some manchai measure, and a bill was introduced in Congress for the es-tablishment of a United States bank, shorn of the objectionable features, which, it was claimed, rendered the old mathematical descent of the old institution dangerous. It was passed with some amendments in both houses of Congress, and to the surprise of the Whig party and the cabinet, it was vetoed by Mr. Tyler. Another bill, prepared to meet the President's obbection's, one of which was the name 'bank" and "a fiscal agency," was formulated with the President's approval, as it was understood, and that was passed by Congress, and shared the same fate as the previous measure, being vetoed, in objectionable terms,

as the Whig leaders charged. In a day or two Mr. Ewing resigned from the cabinet and addressed a letter to Gales and Seaton of the National Intelligencer, saying the bill just vetoed had been drawn in accordance with the President's views and modified to suit him, and was approved by him before it was submitted to Congress, and since then he had heard no objections to it from the President, though it was pending in Congress several days. Mr. Ewing's resignation was followed by the resignation of every cabinet officer except Mr. Webster, who, it was understood, remained to conclude the negotiations pending with Lord Ashburton. The Whigs in both houses, with the exception of "a corporal's guard," as it was called, led by Henry A. Wise, took open grounds against Tyler, and though he had thrown himself into the arms of the

Some days before the veto of the fiscal agency bill was sent to Congress, the Washington correspondent of the New York Herald made the announcement that it would be vetoed, and published the grounds upon which the veto would be based, and when the veto message was sent to Congress, some days later, the Whigs in both houses of Congress denounced the President in the most bitter speeches, The administration of Mr. Tyler was

Mr. Spencer had been secretary of war and was, on the reorganization of the cabinet, transfered to the treasury only a few months before.

The last act of Tyler's administration was the bill for the annexation of Texas, and the appointment of a judge or two of the supreme court, who were called "midnight judges," being appointed during the last hours of his administration.

THE LUCK OF THE FIRST BORN.

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HE LAW is by no means alone in favoring the first-born of a family and comparatively neglecting later comers, for a careful examination of the biographers of our most eminent men

will prove that quite a preponderating number of them owe their fame to the fact that they made their entry into the world in advance

of their brothers and sisters. To such an extent does this appear to be the case that if a dozen names of distinglished men were taken at random it would be quite safe to assert

that four of them (or possibly five) are first sons; of the remainder three are second sons, while younger sons, ranging from number three downward, must content with dividing the small remnant of celebrity among them.

Occasionally a very late comer ac-quires fame; but the odds are all against him. Thus, Benjamin Franklin, the great natural philosopher and politician, had no fewer than fourteen prothers and sisters in front of him; Sir Richard Arkwright, the famous in-ventor, was the thirteenth child of his parents, and Sir Joshua Reynolds was number seven in his family.

But by far the majority of the world's distinctions are shared between first and second small. to the first-born. Fame in the world of letters has gone in quite undue proportions to the eldest born. If we may take Dante, Goethe, Shakespeare and Milton as the four greatest names in the history of the world's literature, we find that all four, with the exception of Shakes-peare, the greatest, it is true, of them all, were eldest sons. This privilege of the first-born is claimed for Shelby, Byron and Heine; and in modern times, to mention names without regard to relative merit, by Ruskin, Max Muller, Frederick Harri-
