Tom Longboat Captures Ten Mile Event at Boston.

Boston, Feb. 13.--Tom Longboat, the Indian long-distance runner, who is to represent Canada at the Olympic games in London next summer, won the 10-mile relay race at the Park Square coliseum tonight, defeating three men. His time was 50 minutes 523-5 sec-onds.

onds. The three men who ran against the Indian were Percy Sellen, holder of the Canadian 5-mile record, Claude E. Peirce, also of Canada, and Bill Cum-mings, of Scotland. At the finish Long-boat was two feet ahead of Peirce. Longboat is now under suspension by the Amateur Athletic union and under usual conditions would not be allowed to compete in the United States, but this difficuly was overcome by racing agains Canadians and obtain-ing a permit from the Canadin Ama-

GENERAL BELL ARGUES FOR INCREASED PAY.

Washington, Feb. 13 .-- Gen. Bell. chief of staff, United States army, today recommended in person to the house committee on military affairs an increased pay schedule for enlisted men of the army, along the lines laid down in the Dick-Capron bill, but differing somewhat in scale. His recmmendation contained four distinct features.

ommendation contained four distinct features. Creation of the grade of warrant of-ficer; for the promotion of desreving non-commissioned officers; readjust-ment of initial rates of pay so that they shall range from \$15 to \$42, as against the range of from \$16 to \$70 in the navy; cash bonus of three months' pay for re-enlistment and an increase of from \$1 to \$9 in pay for high at-tainment in marksmanship. The cor-responding increase in the navy is from \$2 to \$10. It was estimated by Gen. Bell that if these schedules are adopted, the av-erage increase in pay of enlisted men will be \$3.3 per cent, making the aver-age pay \$23.64 in the army as against \$33 in the navy. In conclusion he said: "I cannot too strongly urge the adop-tion of this schedule in its four essen-tial features. If any one of these four features is omitted, the whole plan will be very much weakened, and the benefit to the service materially decreased." Gen. Bell recommended increases of pay for regular army of these four

Berlin, Feb. 13.—A bogus American, "Colonel" Schlemangk, has been sen-tenced by the criminal court to three years' imprisonment, the loss of his civil rights for five years after his re-lease and to perpetual police supervi-sion, as well as to pay a fine of \$300. Schlemangk was convicted of whole-sale marriage swindles by means of an advertisement, whereby he succeeded in obtaining considerable sums of money from women.

from women. Schlemangk was born in Germany, but served in the First artillery, U. S. A. Ho was promoted to non-commis-sioned officer, but finally deserted. He is an accomplished linguist and repre-sented himself as Count Maximillion do Pausy. He asserted that he was a colo-nel in the American army and was act-ing military attache at the American embassy in Berlin.
