

"SPORT DELO" SAYS NELSON IS DIPPY

Declares Durable Dane Has No Business in Ten Round Affairs.

HIS MANY FOOLISH BREAKS.

Thinks it Was Extreme Folly for Bat To Sign With Jimmy Britt In Limited Bout.

Tom Longboat Captures Ten Mile Event at Boston.

Boston, Feb. 13.—Tom Longboat, the Indian long-distance runner, who is to represent Canada at the Olympic games in London next summer, won the 10-mile relay race at the Park Square coliseum tonight, defeating three men. His time was 50 minutes 52.3 seconds.

The three men who ran against the Indian were Percy Sellen, holder of the Canadian 5-mile record, Claude E. Pelree, also of Canada, and Bill Cummings, of Scotland. At the finish Longboat was two feet ahead of Pelree.

Longboat is now under suspension by the Amateur Athletic union and under usual conditions would not be allowed to compete in the United States, but this difficulty was overcome by racing against Canadians and obtaining a permit from the Canadian Amateur Athletic association.

GENERAL BELL ARGUES FOR INCREASED PAY.

Washington, Feb. 13.—Gen. Bell, chief of staff, United States army, today recommended in person to the house committee on military affairs an increased pay schedule for enlisted men of the army, along the lines laid down in the Dick-Capron bill, but differing somewhat in scale. His recommendation contained four distinct features.

Creation of the grade of warrant officer; the promotion of deserving non-commissioned officers; readjustment of initial rates of pay so that they shall range from \$15 to \$42, as against the range of from \$16 to \$70 in the navy; cash bonus of three months' pay for re-enlistment and an increase of from \$1 to \$9 in pay for high attainment in marksmanship. The corresponding increase in the navy is from \$2 to \$10.

It was estimated by Gen. Bell that if these schedules are adopted, the average increase in pay of enlisted men will be 33.3 per cent, making the average pay \$23.64 in the army as against \$33 in the navy.

In conclusion he said: "I cannot too strongly urge the adoption of this schedule in its present essential features. If any one of the four features is omitted, the whole plan will be very much weakened, and the benefit to the service materially decreased."

Gen. Bell recommended an increase of pay for regular army officials as suggested in the Hayward plan.

WOMEN HIS TARGETS.

Told Them Stories That Sounded Like Jangling Legal Tender.

Berlin, Feb. 13.—A bogus American, "Colonel" Schlemmang, has been sentenced by the criminal court to three years' imprisonment, the loss of his civil rights for five years after his release and to perpetual police supervision, as well as to pay a fine of \$300.

Schlemmang was convicted of wholesale marriage swindles by means of an advertisement, whereby he succeeded in obtaining considerable sums of money from women.

Schlemmang was born in Germany, but served in the First artillery, U. S. A. He was promoted to non-commissioned officer, but finally deserted. He is an accomplished hustler and represented himself as Count Maximilian de Pavey. He asserted that he was a colonel in the American army and was acting military attaché at the German embassy in Berlin. By the display of fraudulent bills and checks to the face value of millions he managed to delude

several women into seeking a brilliant marriage.

The evidence in the courts showed that the man had already served terms in the penitentiary, where he made the acquaintance of a notorious criminal, Amandus Hoppe, who assisted him in carrying out his schemes. The latter was sentenced six months in prison as an accomplice.

RECEIVER FOR C. C. & L. RY.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 13.—On representations made by George A. Perdue & Co., a banking firm of Boston, the Chicago, Cincinnati & Louisville Railroad company was placed in the hands of a receiver in the United States circuit court today.

James P. Goodrich was appointed receiver and after filing a bond of \$50,000 left tonight for Cincinnati to take hold of the property.

KAISER WITH SULTAN.

London, Feb. 13.—The foreign office has been advised by Sir E. O'Connor, the British ambassador at Constantinople, that Baron Marschal von Bieberstein, the German diplomatic representative, announced at the last meeting of the ambassadors to Turkey that Germany had decided instead of signing the joint note to the Porte demanding judicial reforms in Macedonia, to agree to the Turkish gendarmerie be placed under the control of Turkey. No confirmation has been received by the foreign office, however, of the report that Germany, Austria-Hungary and Turkey have entered upon secret treaties, but the independent action of Germany in the matter of reforms in Macedonia has caused disquietude, as it upsets the work accomplished during the past year and makes the future uncertain.

CANNON HAS A DISTRICT.

Springfield, Ill., Feb. 13.—The Republican congressional committee of the Twenty-first district met here today and called a convention to select delegates to the national convention for March 8 at Litchfield. The committee passed resolutions endorsing the candidacy of Joseph G. Cannon for president.
