WATCHED STEAM SHOVEL.

when Passing Through Bas Obispo Salute of Twenty-one Charges of Dynamite Fired.

Panama, Nov. 16,-President Rooseweit, who stopped at the Tivoli hotel last night, started at 7 o'clock this morning with Mrs. Roosevelt and the other members of his party to make an examination of the Culebra cut. The weather was overcast, threatening rain. At \$:30 the presidential train arrived at Pedro Miguel, where some steam shovels were at work. The president had his train stopped for the purpose of making a personal examination. At this point in the cut the peculiar soil conditions have resulted in more or less frequent land slides, and this fact was brought to the president's attention. President Roosevelt descended from his train and climbed upon one of the steam shovels, taking a seat alongside Engineer Gray, whom he subjected to a searching fire of questions regarding the work. During his conversation Ensincer Gray took the opportunity on behalf of himself and the other engineers, to declare that, unlike the railread engineers, they were not paid for evertime. The president promised to look into this matter. He stayed on the steam shovel about 20 minutes. By this time it was raining hard.

President Roosevelt told Chief Engineer Stevens that he wanted to see all the works in connection with the excavation, even to the temporary laying of tracks. With this in view, he boardda work train near Pedro Miguel and unt on to the next point, where steam myels were at work. Here there was m danger of landslides.

The presidential train continued on The presidential train continued on the regular line toward Panama. The work of the second steam shovel was observed and the president made a de-teur to examine the site of the Pedro Miguel lock. He shook hands with all the Americans he met while walking

At about 9:25 the president entered the deep portion of Culebra cut, his train going slowly in order that he might observe the workings of the drill machines and shovels. One shovel was deported with a sign reading. "We will do our best to help you build it." The president spent some time in the depost portion of the cut, where last sumay 22 tons of explosives were used throw down 35,000 cubic yards of materia)

The rain was now coming down in tores, and the water poured in riv-ues down the funnel shaped sides of 1902. the famous cut. Several charges of dy-samile were exploded in order that the president might see the effect, after which he went back to his own train. At Rio Grande, with the rain still falling steadily. Mr. Stevens pointed out to the president, the laborers' quar-ters and construction thereon. The president decided to leave his train again and inspect personally the sleep-ing quarters of the Jamalcans. He in-quired how the men were fed and pa-tically listened to their complaints. He went through the commissary where his visit was unexpected, and also pene-trated into the living quarters of the families of several Jamaican laborers. This inspection lasted for three-quarters of an hour, at the end of which the president returned to Culebra, wet through and spattered with mud. At through and spattered with mud. At Culebra the president went through the local offices of the canal constructors. The presidential party ate lunch with Mr. Stevens at 1 o'clock, and after this meal the ladies of the party returned to Panama. The president to Panama. The president went as far as Gorgona. While passing through Bas Obispo, a salute of 21 charges of dynamite was fired. At Matachin President Roosevelt went through the machine shops, the foundries, the planing mills, etc. Before leaving Matachin a crowd of Americans assembled and cheered the Vresident. Philips of Missouri, committed suicide at Rocheport, Mo., today, by drinking poison. He lived in Austin, Tex., 54 years, and once fought a duel with Col. John Marshall because of a political dispute.

Enjoined From Transacting Business In State of Massachusetts.

Boston, Nov. 16 .- A temporary in-Junction prohibiting the American Fire Irsurance company from transacting busi-ness in the state of Massachusetts was issued by Judge Morton in the supreme court today. The injunction was issued as a result of a bill of information filed by Atty-Gen. Dana Malone, who stated that later he would ask that the injunc-tion be made permanent and that a ra-ceiver be appointed on the ground that the company is insolvent. The American Fire Insurance company is one of the old-est fire insurance companies in America. It sunffered heavily as a result of the arthquake in San Francisco. The report of State Insurance Commissioner Fred-cick L. Cutting shows the assets of the company are \$354,255, that its labilities are \$359,556, and that its capital stock is \$300,000. junction prohibiting the American Fire
