

## EVENING NEWS.

Tuesday, June 11, 1882.

### BY TELEGRAPH.

**WASHINGTON, 10.**—Merrill, from the finance committee, reported amendments to the House bill reducing the internal revenue tax. They repeal the 25 per cent duty on all molasses and sugars, standard and imported from abroad, fix the duty on steel railroad bars at \$30 per ton, and duties on the product of loopy band of scroll iron at \$10 per ton. The amendments were printed.

West said that he had been informed that the bill would involve the government in much litigation.

Garland suggested an amendment directing full investigation by the Attorney-General as to the government's title.

At this point Allison presented the conference report on the bank charter bill. It was printed and will be printed and passed over until tomorrow.

After debate the banking proposition was amended to give equity suits to determine the title to lands. The Garland provision also prevailed. Original amendment appropriating \$500,000 was then carried, year 63, says 7. After additional amendments had prevailed, taking on to the bill a total of \$40,000 for Cumberland River, Kentucky. Butler moved an increase of \$200,000, making a total of \$50,000 for Charleston, West Virginia, and \$25,000 for Cumberland River, Kentucky.

Harrison from the committee on transportation route to the seaboard offered an amendment authorizing the Secretary of War, of \$10,000 in completing the surveys for a ship canal to Comble, Chesapeake and Delaware Bays and directing a report to the committee on the cost of operating the canal when completed.

Flunk from the committee on public lands, reported a bill repealing all laws granting lands to the State of Missouri, also in connection with an extension of it from Mountain Railroad, in that State and to restore such lands to the public domain. Passed on the calendar.

Without disposing of the pending bill, adjourned.

**WASHINGTON, 10.**—Hayne offered an amendment appropriating \$25,000, to enable the President to carry out the provision in the revised statutes, authorizing the President to appoint a commission to examine and report on the condition of the public domain, under the school boys and girls might keep out experienced men. The amendment was rejected 51 to 40.

A spirited attack was made by William H. Hooper, White, for his malice and slanderous insinuations.

Crapa submitted a conference report on amending the bill on the associations to extend cooperative existence.

After the criticism of Randall, that perhaps the bill discriminated against the Silver Conference, the report was agreed to, 108 to 70.

The conference report on the bill to increase the water supply of the District of Columbia was agreed to.

The bill passed authorizing the transfer of the property of the National Soldiers and Sailor's Orphan Home, to the Garfield Memorial Hospital.

White introduced a joint resolution proposing a constitutional amendment prohibiting abridgments of rights of citizens of the United States on account of race.

The House went into committee on the sundry civil bill.

On motion of Stewart, of Ohio, the provision was struck from the bill which provides that the managers of the National Home for Disabled Soldiers shall apply to each of the above five dollars per year, all inmates of the Home to support said Home.

The provision admitting to the Home any person who served during the rebellion in the United States navy and was incapacitated from means of support, was struck from the bill.

The bill appropriating \$75,000 for the construction of a quay wall at the New London navy yard, was lost.

The bill completing 50 of the 52 pages, the committee rose.

Dingley, of Maine, introduced a bill for the appointment of a commission to inquire into the condition of the public domain, and the right of interests, and to suggest methods to restore the foreign carrying trade of the United States. Adjourned.

They are to be based on the transactions connected with the Salisbury contract on the Louisiana and Texas routes. It is rumored that Walsh and Brady have a witness against the other.






