LOCAL BRIEFS.

Halterson Vice Consul.—John Halterson of this city has been appointed Norwegian vice consul for Utah.

Wool at 21 Cents.—E. J. Kearnes of Gunnison reports wool in his part of the state as selling at 18 to 21 cents.

Ball at Salt Lake.—The State University Athletic Council will give a ball this evening at Salt Lake in honor of the 10 visiting high schools.

Sold for \$10,000.—James E. Paine has sold to Dr. E. D. Woodruff for \$10,000 a vacant lot at First North and State streets. Improvements will be made there later.

Will Locate Here.—L. J. Haddock of Pocatello will remove to this city, and become manager of the International Electrical company, so the Pocatello Tribune announces.

Pipe Laying Contract.—Hanley & Ritchie of this city have the sub-contract for laying 32 miles of water pipe for the Fruit, Colo. water works from the neighboring mountains.

Underwriters Coming.—Representatives of the National card of Fire Underwriters are scheduled to visit this city next summer to examine the measures taken here to protect against fire.

Charges Against Union.—The local molder's union charges the Foundry Employees union with doing what it can to prevent the success of the strike now in progress. The Federation of Labor will investigate.

Good Resolutions.—The senior class at the High school met yesterday afternoon, to adopt the honor system, and every member of the class will sign the pledge to abstain from any underhanded work during the coming examinations.

A Destitute Family.—It was reported to the "News" this afternoon that there is a destitute family residing at 433 south Fourth West street, and that their condition is so extreme as to call for the most prompt relief from some of the charitable organizations of the city.

Vests Helped Some.—W. Anderson has returned from San Francisco, where he left his trunk to be fed the fire. He was pulling it after him with a rope, but as he could not go fast enough for the soldiers, they made him leave it; so he grabbed a bunch of clothing from the trunk before giving it up, only to find later that he had an awful lot of vests, and nothing else.

Sealskin Coat Stolen.—Mrs. J. R. Tanner, a guest at the Manitou hotel, reported to the police authorities the loss of a valuable sealskin coat. The lady arrived a day or two ago, with her children, from San Francisco, where she lost most of her possessions in the recent earthquake and fire. Among the effects saved was the coat which has now so mysteriously disappeared. It is valued at \$500. Detectives are working on the case, with strong hopes of recovering the lost article.

Big Business in Oakland.—J. H. Colborn, a New York shoe man, is at the Knutsford from San Francisco. He reports a general rush for temporary business quarters to Filmore street and Van Ness avenue. One firm rented a 50 room front lot for \$600 rental per month, and rentals are now soaring sky high. The amount of business in Oakland is something terrific. Thousands of people are going over there from the ruined city to transact business, and certain lines of trade are coming money.

Visits Prof. Lyman.—Prof. Lyman of the University of Utah was today escorting a New York friend in the person of Dr. Chauncey Pratt Biggs, over the city. Dr. Biggs has been on a visit to southern California. He did not go to San Francisco for the reason that he would rather stay in Los Angeles and see the beauties of the country, than go north and witness the ruins of the earthquake. Prof. Lyman and Dr. Biggs became acquainted in Illinois when the former was attending Cornell university. Dr. Biggs was also the physician of the Lyman family at that time.

Lively Runaway.—A team belonging to the Krug Brewing company ran away from West Temple street yesterday afternoon. James Lawless was the driver, and he, with his brother who occupied the seat with him, were thrown to the ground. The team holding the lines held on for some time, but finally had to let go owing to injuries received from being dragged. At Second South street the team collided with an express wagon, and in the mixup the latter vehicle was smashed, and the runaway horses became detached from the wagon. Turning over towards East Temple street, the team was stopped in front of the Cullen hotel.
