Chleage, Jan. 25.—Chairman August Herrmann of the national base-ball commission has issued the official finding of the commission in the case of Player James Sebring, the Cub's in-eligible outfielder, who recently asked for reinstatement to organized baseball, and

This request was granted without any prorest, and when he returned to Cincinnati nothing was deducted from his salary on account of his absence, but, on the contrary, an agreement was entered into between the player and the club whereby on account of the unfortunate condition at his home, he was allowed its each the other was to be paid at the end of the year.

The Texas has always been unlucky, and her general reputation in the navy is shown by the circumstance that she is usually re-ferred to as the "hoodoo" ship. there are many in Congress who believe that she deserves a better fate than is proposed by the Maryland representa-tive. Mr. Mudd's plan is to bring the Texas up the Potomac to the Indian Head proving grounds, remove her crew, guns and furnishings, and then fire dynamite shells at her in order to determine the effect of such shells on armor. Even those who have no senti-mental feelings toward the Texas think this would be a rather extravagant proceeding, and for that reason the chances of the Mudd bill are not con-sidered good.

WHAT A NEWSPAFER MAY BE.

The Advertisements Mist Not Exceed Fifty Per Cent of the Superficial Area.

Washington, Jan. 27 .- The report of the joint postal commission authorized the last session of Contress to investigate and report to that body its conclusions on the operation and effect of the existing laws relative to secondclass mail matter and what changes, if any, should be made, was made pub-He today. The commission makes a number of sweeping recommendations ooking to a reform ir the postal service, and has drafted a measure embodying such changes as it thinks ought to be made. Among the most important additions to existing laws as regards second-class nail matter embodied in the measure are the follow-

Ing: "A newspaper or other periodical may be in part composed of advertise-ments which are permanently inserted in, or attached to, but such advertise-ments shall not constitute more than 50 per centum of the superficial area of any issue of the publication; nor shall any advertisement be printed on card, cloth or any substame other than paper, nor upon paper of any greater weight than the text of such publica-tion. ing

"An issue of a newspaper or other periodical may be composed of parts or sections, but all such parts or sections shall be made of the same size, form

sections, but all such parts or sections shall be made of the same size, form and weight of paper, and shall, when taken together, form ane complete and identifiable whole. Provisions of law applicable to a newspaper or period-loal shall apply equaly to each and every section thereof. "With a regular issue of a newspaper or other periodical the supplement may be enclosed or folded. The supple-ments shall not be irinted on other substance than paper ior, except in the case of maps and plass illustrative of the text, shall be of diferent form from the main body of the publication. No supplement shall be composed of or confain advertisements, but the same shall be confined to mitter germane to the regular issue and suppled in order to complete matter left incomplete in the main body of the publication." The proposed law refises the second-class rate to periodical publications consisting wholly or substantially of fiction.

"With each issue of a newspaper or "With each issue of a newspaper or other periodical the publisher may mail at the second-class rate of post-age samples of such issue, but 'not to exceed 10 per centum of the total num-ber of the copies of eich issue mailed by him to actual subscribers, as the same appears by a svorn statement of such issue required to be submitted to the postmaster at the office of mail-ing."

The appointment of a postal appeals ing."" The appointment of a postal appeals commission in the postoffice depart-ment is provided for, to consist of three members, at least one of whom shall be a person who has had actual expe-rience in the conduct of the publish-ing business, and at least one of whom shall be learned in the law and a mem-ber of 10 years' standing of the bar of the highest court of some state or territory of the United States or the District of Ceiumbia. The commission is to enter upon its duties July 1 next. The object of this commission is to allow the proprietor or publisher of any newspaper or periodical publication, the application for the admission of which to the second-class of mail mat-ter has been denied by the postmas-ter general, to appeal to it, and which commission shall hear, consider and de-termine such appeal with respect as well to matters of fact as matters of law.

The commission recommends the scheme of progressive reduction of compensation for mail carried in ex-cess of 5,000 pounds a day, which is em-bodied in the accompanying bill. It is estimated by the officials of the railway mail service that the total de-crease in compensation will be for the fiscal year 1908 approximately \$3,000,000. As a remedy for the disparity be-tween the receipts and the cost in con-mection with the transportation of mail, the commission suggests that the practise no longer continue of charg-

nection with the transportation of mail, the commission suggests that the practise no longer continue of charg-ing on a losing basis the same rate for wholly dissimilar service. In this con-nection it is suggested that the incre-ment for the postage for the increment of weight above the first four ounces should be one-half cent for each addi-tional four ounces. The commission holds with regard to fiction matter that the classification which puts a complete novel in one class and a novel published scrilly in another class is a false classification. With regard to newspapers, the com-mission maintains that the purpose de-scribed is so broad as to include every-thing and exclude nothing. "With the exception of a few instances," it says, "where the publication has been ex-cluded because the information was deemed not to be public, no periodical has ever been classified by the tests that should be applied. This generally would simply end in a press censor-shin."

While admitting that its recommen-dations do not afford a complete prac-tical solution of the problem, the com-mission is of the opinion that the changes recommended will accomplish everything that has been claimed for them; that they are exceedingly con-servative and may be put into opera-tion without disturbing to any considtion without disturbing to any consid. erable degree the important interests concerned.

BIG BOND ISSUE PROPOSED. An entirely new plan for the improve-ment of the rivers and harbors of the country has been proposed by Repre-sentative Bartholdt of Missouri, who is chairman of the house committee on public buildings and grounds. The ac-tivity of commercial bodies in various parts of the country has created a considerable sentiment in favor of reg-ular annual appropriations of \$50,000 000 each, but Mr. Bartholdt goes beyond that point and in a bill introduced in the house provides for a bond issue amounting to \$500,000,000, due in 50 years, to be used in the betterment of waterways. There is not the slightest chance of favorable action on the bill at present, but it is interesting as show-nalized rates by making universal warailroad rates by making universal wa-ter competition possible.

BULLETS WITH MESSAGE. The comment which followed the president's action in illustrating his special message on the Panama canal was insignificant as compared with the talk which a more recent performance created. When the last specal message on the Brownsville incident was sent to the senate, the White House secre-tary who brought it in carried also a package which resembled a large box of candy. Naturally there was much spec-ulation as to its contents, especially as it was obvious that it had something to do with the message. When it was opened finally, the clerk who performed the operation took out a number of sou-ventrs of the riot in the little Texas town last August. There were empty shells, steel bullet casings and other things tending to show that the shots fired on the night of the disturbance must have come from the rifles used in the army. The incident was probably without precedent in the senate.

NEGROES APPLAUD TILLMAN. A remarkable feature of the debate on the Brownsville investigation reso-lution was the attitude of the negroes toward Senator Tillman, the only Democrat who criticised the president for the discharge of the colored troops. Every day while the debate was in progress the public galleries contained many colored men and women, and out in the corridors were many more who could not gain admittance. Although the South Carolina senator is notorious as a critic of the negro race and has openly declared that lynching will con-tinue as long as the crime which it was originally intended to punish is com-mitted, the colored spectators seemed to be willing to overlook everything of that sort, and on more than one oc-casion they joined in with white specta-tors when the galleries applauded. WATER FOR KENTUCKY LADIES.

Well to matters of fact as matters of law. Authority is given the postmaster to require an opinion of the commission regarding questions of law, regarding the classification of mail matter and the right to admission to the second class. If, in the judgment of the postmas-ter general, the class privilege of any publication should be suspended, re-voked or annulled, he must submit the case by petition or by information to the commission. Publishers and pro-prietors are to be given due notice of application to the commission, together with the grounds on which such sus-pension, annullment or revocation shall be made. Persons to whom such no-tice is given are required to answer the is given are required to answer such rule, petition or application, and the commission is empowered to hear the case and render a decision.

The findings, decisions, determination or judgment of the commission on any appeal from the refusal to admit sec-ond-class publications or for the re-moval from the second class or the suspension, annuliment or revocation of its second-class privilege, shall be final and conclusive. The construction or application of any law or statute relating to classifi-cation of mail matter made by the com-mission shall be controlling on the post-office and all its employes, unless over-rulled by some competent court of the United States.
