

## SUNDAY SERVICES.

Three Speakers Occupied the Stand at the Tabernacle Yesterday Afternoon.

Religious services were conducted in the Tabernacle yesterday (Sunday) afternoon, February 11th, 1894. Joseph E. Taylor, of the Tabernacle presidency, presided.

Elder H. C. Young first announced the congregation. He expressed his belief that there are many good people on the earth who, though not members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, will give salvation in the life to come. But he was pleased to know that the Latter-day Saints have received the word of salvation, which is the gospel of the Kingdom, which is the saving gospel of the world.

The speaker then referred to the fact that in this age more tangible evidence can be had of the truths of Christianity than could be obtained for many centuries. Joseph Smith, the greatest prophet, the greatest evangelist, has left us his organization, a true Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. After investigating by Elder George Hyatt, the speaker

trusted the golden plates from whence the Book of Mormon was translated. To corroborate the truth of those golden plates, Elder George Hyatt, with his wife, went to see the original manuscript of the Book of Mormon, which had been recovered from the hands of the Indians in the United States.

Elder A. W. Feltz, of the presidency of the Tabernacle next spoke. He said that if the Latter-day Saints are anything they are a people who have had the character and providence of God over them.

There are many who believe the Saints, because of the Eternal Father and His Son Jesus Christ, are the last and greatest of all the children of God. They have been tested from the beginning in this age, that John the Baptist appears to Joseph Smith and Oliver Cowdery and scattered upon them the Anthonite Prophets, that the world may be saved.

John the Baptist sent his angel to the world, flying in the midst of heaven with the everlasting gospel has appeared, and has another great epoch in the history of the world, been ushered in.
