# IDAHO.

Weekly Weather and Crop Bulletin. Boise, Idaho, May 22 .- During the past week the temperature averaged 1 degree below the normal for the whole State: howver, it was slightly above normal in the western districts and considera-ble below in many of the eastern and entral counties. On the morning of the 6th unusually severe thunderstorms oc-urred throughout the western counties. and light showers accurred in the east ern counties in the 17th, 19th and 20th There was a general frost on the 17th Frost also accurred in the eastern coup-ties on the 18th and 19th. The precipitation for the week averaged slightly below the normal. During the first part of the week high winds prevailed.

CROPS.

Fruit-Though frost occurred no dam-nge was done to fruit, except to some strawberry bloom in northern and cast-ern sections. High wind, which accom-panied the thunderstorms on the morn-ing off the 16th, uprooled some fruit friez, and dismembered many weak trees.
