

## DESCRIPTION OF CONVENTION HALL

First Impression One Gets from A View of Building is That of Permanency.

NUMBER OF SEATS IS 11,538

Entrance Arrangements Unusually Effective—In Emergency Could be Emptied in 2 Minutes.

Denver, Colo., July 7.—Practical test was applied today to the great convention hall which the people of Denver have erected especially for the Democratic national convention. Let none entertain the idea, as did many of the delegates before their arrival here, that the convention will meet in a great barn-like temporary structure, hastily flung together with frail and inflammable materials, to serve somehow for one occasion; of doubtful acoustic properties and scant fitness for even a temporary purpose. The first impression the stranger gets from a view of the building is that of permanency. Granite, steel, brick and concrete have been used without stint. This is first of all a vast house for meeting of large conventions; not only this one, but many yet to gather from all parts of the country. On the other hand, for the people of Denver it is to be a home theater, well planned, convenient and of reasonable proportions to house in comfort audiences to be gathered in the wide awake city of nearly 500,000 people.

**THE BUILDING.**  
The building of pale gray brick and granite, occupies the entire fourteenth street half of the block on the east side of Fourteenth between Curtis and Champa streets on the western edge of the business section of the city, and within easy walk of the hotels and the business section. It is a massive structure effective in design and a beauty of its own. There is entire absence of tawdry, "ginger bread," effects and the lines are simple and stately, yet graceful and pleasing. Within the arrangement of the Auditorium seems to be especially well planned to secure the utmost of capacity and the greatest convenience of the delegates and others attending the convention. The seating arrangements of the platform and seating differs from that of the Chicago Coliseum in that while there the platform was at one end of the auditorium, here it is at the side so that no auditor is more than half the length of the hall from the speaker. The reservation for the delegates and alternates is in the center, extending clear across the hall, the spaces for spectators are at the ends and in the ample galleries.

**ENTRANCES AND EXITS.**  
The arrangement of entrances is more than ordinarily effective and is said that in case of emergency the Auditorium could be emptied and every person put on the street within two minutes. Fire apparatus is located at convenient points and 15 streams of water are immediately available. As a matter of fact, the building is practically fireproof, the doors are of concrete and the only material of an inflammable sort is in the temporary platforms and stairways erected for this convention, and the immense amount of bunting used in the elaborate decorations. These decorations are more profuse than at Chicago in a harmonious scheme of natural flags and red, white and blue streamers. Masses of flags are placed at appropriate points, while the ceiling is covered with red, white and blue stars, each bearing the name of a state.

**OVER ROSTRUM.**  
Over the rostrum is an immense por-

trait of Washington, with Jefferson at one side and Jackson at the other, while from the middle of the opposite wall, facing the speakers, is another large portrait of the late ex-President Grover Cleveland. A very large number of incandescent electric lights are used in lighting the hall; the number considerable over 3,000, representing a total candle power above 50,000. These are in addition to a system of "ceiling sunbursts," 14 in number, and each containing 30 candle lamps. A red light indicates the location of each exit.

**NUMBER OF SEATS.**  
The exact number of seats in the Auditorium under present arrangements is 11,538, but in a pinch more than 12,000 people can be accommodated. On the first floor alone there are 6,022 regular seats.

Upon the platform there are 445 seats, reserved for members of the national committee and for guests of honor. The number of seats on the rostrum is 101. Directly in front of the rostrum are six tables for noiseless telegraph instruments of the Associated Press and other press associations and the telephone and telegraph companies, and all these have additional space in the basements.

**NUMBER OF DELEGATES.**

The exact number of delegates to the convention is 1,002, but in the section reserved for the delegates which is in front of the rostrum there are 1,072 seats. This is accounted for by the fact that several states have selected twice their allotted number of delegates, giving each a half vote. The section for alternates has 1,002 seats, no additions having been made by states that doubled their delegations. To the right and left of the rostrum a flight of stairs leads down to the basement where telegraph instruments and private telephone booths are located. Beneath the rostrum is a tunnel connecting the two divisions of the press section, so that if correspondents have occasion to cross from one side to the other, they need not pass between the speaker and the audience. This tunnel will be used also by messengers and secretaries.

Admission to the Auditorium can be had only by ticket. Officers and attaches of the convention and newspaper correspondents must wear badges and present tickets. Tickets admit only at the entrances design-

nated. Upon each is printed the letter of an entrance, and for the public, number of the sections where the holder must sit. Seats for the public are not reserved, but the seating space is divided into sections numbered consecutively and the holder of a ticket is entitled to occupy a vacant seat in the section marked on the ticket.

All that a guest has to do is to find the proper entrance and the ushers will do the rest. By this system the public can be seated quickly and delay in opening the sections of the convention is expected to be avoided.

**LOCATION OF DELEGATIONS.**

In the location of the delegations, Nebraska, the state of William Jennings Bryan, is squarely in front of the rostrum, with Indiana and Texas, on the front at the left, and Alabama at the right. New York is right behind Nebraska and Illinois behind Indiana and Texas.

**PUBLIC PRAYER ANSWERED.**

Was That Resorts at Irving Park Might be Burned and They Were.

Chicago, July 7.—Twelve hours after the Rev. George Edward Lewis, in a public prayer, asked that the amusement resorts of Irving Park, where liquor is served, might be burned to the ground, "Excelsior" park was consumed by fire yesterday. The prayer was offered during a revival meeting. Proprietors of other parks in the neighborhood are taking precautions to protect their properties. An investigation is to be made. The police are looking for the men who were seen near the park early in the day.

**ALLEGED BLACK HAND BOMB MAKER ARRESTED**

New York, July 7.—Detectives of the Italian squad last night arrested a man who they claim was the maker of the bombs used in recent Black Hand outrages. He said he was Savarile Virzi, a well-to-do grocer, 50 years old, and had been in this country ten years. He declared that his arrest was an outrage. He was not moved even when the detectives exhibited a memorandum book in which were many strange formulas, apparently giving directions for the manufacture of bombs, as well as well-executed drawings of the ground plans of houses, in some of which, according to the police, bombs have been exploded already.

"The book is not mine," he said. "I know nothing about it. I do not know the Black Hand and I do not make bombs."

Later the detectives brought in four more men, alleged to be accomplices of Virzi. Letters said to have been sent by blackmailed victims to the gang in response to demands for money were seized also.

According to the detectives there is enough evidence in the book which Virzi repudiated to make all his denials of a repudiable nature. The girl's name is the master bomb-maker for the Black Hand of this city.

**GIRL IS DEAD AND MAN MORTALLY WOUNDED**

Chicago, July 7.—A dispatch to the Record-Herald from Vincennes, Ind., says: Miss Mayme Baker, 29 years, old, is dead and Charles Ingie, 40 years old, is mortally wounded as the result of a remarkable tragedy in a girl's room yesterday. Mrs. Ollie Youngblood Ellis, a cousin of the girl killed, admits it is alleged, that she fired all the shots. Mystery surrounds the affair and the stories of the wounded man and the woman do not agree. Ingie insists that the shooting was without provocation. The bullets which ended Miss Baker's life were aimed at Ingie who, Mrs. Ellis says, at the time had the girl in his grasp.

Ingie was taken to the jail on suspicion that he had killed the girl and despite prompt treatment of his wounds, the surgeons hold out no hope for his recovery.

The story of a supposed wrong to a sister, which Ingie sought to right, and upon the woman, his visit of warning the two, Mrs. Ellis' defense of her cousin and the resultant tragedy, is a remarkable one, and the sister's husband, Richard Lovejoy, last night was locked up pending a full investigation by the police.

Lovejoy, who is a contracting carpenter, alleged to have been in the house when the shooting took place.

**BANK GETS NEW CASHIER.**

Walter D. Fitzgerald Takes Charge at West Jordan Financial Institution.

Pending the result of the indictment found against him by the federal grand jury, A. W. Nelson has been removed as cashier of the Jordan State bank, located at West Jordan.

Previous to being removed by the board of directors, young Nelson was asked to resign, and stated that on advice of his attorney he had decided not to take the action voluntarily. The matter was then voted on by the directors with the result that Nelson was displaced by Walter D. Fitzgerald, who for a long time has served as bookkeeper in the bank.

The meeting of directors at which the matter was considered was held yesterday afternoon and the business transacted besides the changing of cashiers was the selection of Carl O. W. Pierson of Salt Lake City as bookkeeper in the position until then held by Mr. Fitzgerald.

## WHOLE FAMILY PERISH IN FLOOD

At Unadilla, Neb., a Cloudburst Swept the House of Joseph Doyle Into the River.

ALL WITHIN WERE DROWNED

At Lincoln Five Persons Lose Their Lives in Rushing Waters—Water Two to Fifteen Feet Deep.

Lincoln, July 6.—Lincoln today experienced what was probably the worst flood in its history, causing the known loss of five lives and possibly two others, minor injuries of several, a property loss which cannot be even approximately estimated, an almost total suspension of railroad traffic to and from the city, and hundreds of families who have been driven from their homes are tonight sheltered in public buildings and private residences.

**THE DEAD.**

John Matson, drowned while trying to rescue stock.

Three children of Henry Amsel, a boy aged 8, a girl aged 12 and a girl aged 11. They fell from a boat after being rescued from the flooded home.

Mrs. Schuster, who died from fright and exposure after being taken from her home.

A young man named Willard Nichols was caught in the flood while returning home from work about 8 o'clock this morning. He climbed a telephone pole and citizens say they saw him after clinging for hours, fall in the water. No trace of him has since been found.

A child of a Russian family, name unknown, was reported drowned, but the report has not been verified. The drownings occurred between 6 and 8 o'clock this morning, when the flood was at its height, but the identity of the victims could not be learned before this evening. The flood followed the greatest downpour of rain known here for many years. The Lincoln electric light plant is flooded.

The flood tonight is subsiding. Acting Mayor Marshall tonight issued an appeal for a donation for flood victims. An army of 25 regulars and 100 western passenger stations were two feet deep in water, while the Rock Island line was washed out, both north and south of the city, making it impossible to bring to Lincoln any of the trains scheduled to arrive during the day. The Northwestern passenger station was just outside the voter line, but its roadbed is said to be so far under water west of the city that it did not attempt to move its afternoon train scheduled to leave the city at 1:30 o'clock.

A cloudburst swept their house into the river. Doyle got out and started for help, but fell from a bridge into the torrent. All the occupants of the house were lost.

**FIVE PEOPLE DROWNED.**

Salt Lake County Commissioners Appoint Agents for Coming Election.
