

First Impression One Gets from A View of Building is That Of Permanency.

Entrance Arrangements Unusually Ef. fective-In Emergency Could be Emptied in 2 Minutes.

Denver, Colo., July 7 .- Practical test was applied today to the great convention hall which the people of Denver have erected especially for the Democratic national convention. Let none entertain the idea, as did many of the delegates before their arrival here, that the convention is to meet in a great barn-like temporary struc-ture, hastlly flung together with frail and inflammable materials, to serve somehow for one occasion; of doubt-ful accoustic properties and scant fit-mess for even a temporary purpose. The first impression the "ranger gets from a view of the buil — is that of per-manency. This is first of all a vast house for meeting of large conventions; not only this one, but many yet to gather from the other of the county. This one, but many yet to gather from all parts of the country. On the other hand, for the people of Denver it is to be a home theater, well planned, con-venient and of reasonable proportions to house in comfort audiences to be contained in comfort audiences to be gathered in a wide awake city of nearly 200,000 people.

THE BUILDING.

The building of pale gray brick and granite, occupies the entire Four-centh street half of the block on the east side of Fourteenth between Curtis and Champa streets on the western edge of the business section of the city, and within easy walk of the hotels and railroads. It is a massive structure and within easy walk of the hotels and railroads. It is a massive structure effective in design and a beauty of its own. There is entire absence of taw-dry, "ginger bread," effects and the lines are simple and stately, yet grace-ful and pleasing. Within the arrange-ment of the Auditorium appears to be especially well planned to secure the ultrost of capacity and the greatest convenience of the delegates and others desirous of seeing and hearing. The arrangements of the platform and seat-ing differs from that of the Chicago ing differs from that of the Chicago Collseum in that while there the plat-form was at one end of the auditorium, here it is at the side so that no audi-tor is more than half the length of the hall from the speaker. ENTRANCES AND EXITS. ENTRANCES AND EXITS. The arrangement of entrances is more than ordinarily effective and is said that in case of emergency the Auditor-tum could be emptied and every person put on the street within two minutes. Fire apparatus is located at conven-tent points and 15 streams of water of fact, the building is practically fireproof, the floors are of concrete and the only material of an inflamma-ble sort is in the temporary platforms and stairways erected for this conven-tion, and the immense amount of bunttion, and the immense amount of bunttuon, and the immense amount of buni-ing used in the elaborate decorations. This is accounted for by the fact that several states have se-lected twice their allotted number of delegates, giving each a half vote. nated. Upon each is printed the let-ter of an entrance, and for the public, the number of the sections where the holder must sit. Seats for the public are not reserved, but the seating space are not reserved, but the seating space is divided into sections numbered con-secutively and the holder of a ticket is entitled to occupy a vacant seat in the section numbered on the ticket. All that a guest has to do is to find the proper entrance and the ushers will do the rest. By this sys-tem the public can be seated quickly and delay in opening the sessions of the convention is expected to be avoid-ed.

LOCATION OF DELEGATIONS. In the location of the delegations, Nebraska, the state of William Jen-nings Bryan, is squarely in front of the rostrum, with Indiana and Texas, on the front at the left, and Alabama at the right. WHOLE FAMILY PERISH IN FLOOD

At Unadilla, Neb., a Cloudburst Swept the House of Joseph Doyle Into the River.

ALL WITHIN WERE DROWNED At Lincoln Five Persons Lose Their Lives in Rushing Waters-Water

Two to Fifteen Feet Deep,

Lincoln, July 6 .- Lincoln today experienced what was probably the worst flood in its history, causing the known loss of five lives and possibly two others, minor injuries of several, a property loss which cannot be even approxmately estimated, an almost total suspension of railroad traffic to and from

the city, and hundreds of families who have been driven from their homes are tonight sheltered in public build-ings and private residences.

The flood tonight is subsiding. Act-ing Mayor Marshall tonight issued an appeal for a donation for flood victims. An area of 25 square miles was covered with water from two to 1b feet deep. The Burlington & North-western passenger stations were two feet deep in water, while the Rock Is-land lines were washed out, both north and south of the city, making it im-possible to bring to Lincoln any of the trains scheduled to arrive during the day. The Northwestern passenger station was just outside the water linc, but its roadbed is said to be so far un-der water west of the city that it did not attempt to move its afternoon train scheduled to leave the city at 1:55 o'clock cheduled to leave the city at 1:50 'clock,
