Slavers of George Rose Fail In Appeal to Mexican Court.

Old friends and acquaimances of the late George W, Rose, the Salt Laker who was murdered by three natives of Guanajuato, Mexico, will be interested in the following item appearing in the Mexican Herald:

the Mexican Herald: "The judge of the federal justice court before whom came the appeal for amparo of the assassins of the late George W. Rose, an American, has de-cided against the appeal and the judg-ment of the district judge imposing sentence of death for the crime com-mitted a year ago must stand. "The murder was done in an infam-ous manner in the Garridos, this city, by Nieto, Rico and Rangel, in the dead of night, the prime object being rob-bery. The murdered man, in trying to defend his house, also his wife and

defend his house, also his wife and child, was set upon by these men and almost hacked to pieces with machetes. The tragedy deeply shocked all the community here."
