#### Judge Morse Restores Title to Property to Daniel Jones.

When Mrs. Ellen Joice Evans secured deeds to the property of her husband, Daniel Jones, of Murray, Judge Morst held this morning that Jones was insanc, and that undue influence was used to gain possession to the property. After she had obtained possession of the property she sold it to Homer Thomas, who was made a party to this suit and the transfer is held to be illegal.

Jones' first wife died in May, 1992 and a short time afterward he walked off of a load of hay and was seriously injured. In November, 1902 Mrs. Evans within a week afterwards Jones was sent to the State Mental hospital where

he remained for several months. In the case of Sylvester James against Ellen M. McLean, the plaintiff was given title to a piece of property. Mrs. McLean's claims to the property were declared to be null and void.
