In discussing this matter, Bishop Harris said:

This incident will not lessen the cor-diality of the relations that now exist between the two governments. It is true that there has of late been a reign of hoodlumism in San Francisco, and Japanese there have been shamefully ill-treated in many cases. I was there for a week in August at the time it was really unsafe for Japanese to venture in the streets at night. "In spite of these thugs, however, the Japanese are fully aware that they proceed from local conditions, and do not indicate a national prejudice on our part. The Japanese propie are sincere-ly desirous of maintaining good rela-tions with the Americans. They have the greatest respect for President Roosevelt, too, and they are satisfied that under his direction the American government will do what is right. Whatever he says or does is wisely commented on in Japan, and the people there have confidence that what he may do will be right."
