Seeing the phase which the affair had assumed the treed sportsman came to the conclusion that he might as well exercise his lungs some, too, and began to shout most manfully in both French and English, for he was one of the creole sort. He was soon replied to and eventually approached and taken off by a couple of those men who earn a difficult livelihood by cutting wood in the swamp, and bringing it out in the little flat bottomed skiffs or punts with which they navigate the little winding bayous which thread the muddy wilderness in every direction. — [Cor.
