He participated in the Indian wars, and shared in the general hardships incident to building homes in this once desert land.

Brother Clark was a humble, unassuming man of a practical mind, rather reticent, but ever ready to defend the interests of the kingdom of God. The cause of his death was old age. He was confined to his bed in his last illness only a week, and retained his mental faculties to the last. He died in faith, possessing the hope of a glorious resurrection.—[COM.]
