INTERESTING FROM ARIZONA.

MAY 29TH, 1879.

Editors Deseret News:

As I have been traveling for a
season as a missionary among the
Saints and Lamantines in Arizona,
and have written to you before,
about the various kinds of plants
they were raising good wheat, pe-
asparagus, eggs, squashes and
vegetables without irrigation, their
altitude being 7,755 feet. On the
morning of the 22d, we drove eight
miles west to San Francisco Springs,
John W. Young, who has erected
two buildings and done a good deal
of fencing, his house and springs
stand at the north end of one of the
finest parks, either natural or artificial
I ever saw; it contains about
600 acres of land, all well irrigated
and entirely escape the dangerous
crossing of the terrible mountains.

We crossed the Colorado River
below the city, confined within
its narrow bed by solid perpendicular
stone walls 2,000 feet high,
which made the stream look quite
diminutive. It being a very dry
season through the entire country,
the water, tanks and springs
were dried up in a great measure,
it makes it very difficult for com-
panies to travel this season for the
want of water for both man and
beast. The distance from Wilson
Springs to Moan Copy is some 15
miles over a strange country of
barren desert of rocks, sand hills,
mounds, gravel beds, and many
curious rocks look as though they
were hewed, some of them 20 feet
long by 18 inches wide, and 12
to 15 inches thick; and hills of them
are scattered about, and rocks
everywhere.

The altitude of San Francisco
springs was 8040 feet, still the men
eight miles south, who had spent
several winters there, said they
had but little snow and that the
stock fat all the year round.

from Moan Copy, we found
