As his son Carl stated at the funeral, "No one ever went from his door hungry, and in a long career of business he never sued any man in court for a debt; he was an honest,

temperate, moral man, and greatly respected." He was the pioneer of this great valley, locating at Tempe and built up

excellent flouring mills, and other in-dustries, promoting the opening of roads, canals, farms, and whatever he could to build up the country.

His motto was. "Peace and good will among men." A few days before he died, in conversation, he referred to the war in South Africa, and the Philippines as oppressive, cruel and wasteful. He was active to the last and had no bodily allments, but took a chill and being worn out by arduous labors, as he expressed it, he wanted rest and so peacefully went to sleep.

## SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY. The manufacture of sulphuric acid,

### upon which depend many and varied industries, is undergoing a transforma-tion. For nearly 150 years it has been made by causing the fumes of burning sulphur or sulphides to take up more oxygen from nitrous vapor in the pres ence of steam, the process requiring an expensive plant of lead chambers, purifying towers, etc. By the processes now being developed in Germany, the sul-phur fumes and oxygen are being combined directly. The union is effected by means of catalysis, the chemical action which results from mere contact with some such substance as platinum black, which itself is not changed and does not enter into the new compaund, and the difficulties in the way of applying the principle on a large scale are being gradually overcome. Much depends on the regulation of the heat

lamage has been secured, and hall insurance has been abandoned. The apparatus is a small cannon surme by a long conical trumpet, which trans-mits to the threatening cloud the vortex and concussion of a small charge of black powder. A breech-loading rapid-fire gun, throwing bombs with time fuses to the height of a mile or

more, has now been brought forward, and a system of 800 hail-preventing stations, using these guns, is being established for the protection of the vineyards in the region of Brescia. In the experiments thus far made it has been thought necessary to have the stations not more than about a half mile apart in regions subject to hail-

Cultivation of the nettle is an important experiment projected for the Cameroons. Nettle fiber is being used in German factories for fine yarns and tissues, and the products are unsur-passed by those from any known vegetable source. Nettle growing in dis-tricts adapted to it is thus made an industry of great promise.

The pllot torpedo of Obecchioni, which received a high award at the Rochelle nautical congress, is designed to prevent collisions in fog at sea. It is driven by a ten-horse-power electric motor, and is kept from 900 to 1,600 feet ahead of the steamer to be pro-tected, being connected by two ropes carrying insulated wires. If an ob-stacle is struck, a bell on the steamer is rung automatically.

The rapid failure of Welsbach burners has been traced by a Dutch chemist in one instance to the deposition on the mantles of iron-carbonyl, which proved to be a result of the action of uncarburetted water-gas on the cold pipes at ordinary pressures. Coating of the interior of the pipes with coal-tar

is a suggested remedy. India offers the best field for long range weather forecasts, yet the con-ditions last June seemed to indicate a rainfall above the normal for the three months ending February, 1900, the reality being the greatest drought of the century.

One of the most successful popularizers of science of the day is **Prof.** C. V. Boys, F. R. S. In a late Royal Institu-tion lecture, he dealt most happily with the "surface tension" of liquids-the property that causes water to form in rops, makes it cling to the meshes of a fine sleve, produces capillary attraction, and accounts for sonp bubbles. The meshes of a fine wire sleve were greased with paraffin, a sheet of paper being then spread over the bottom. Water was poured into the sieve, and, when the paper was carefully withdrawn, it refused to run out, being upheld by the elastic skin of the lower surface, which

caused it to cover the meshes like a solid. For a like reason the sieve flat-ed on water. The same elastic skin supported a column of water in an inverted test-tube, but when the tub was brought into an atmosphere of ether, the elasticity of the water skin relaxed, and the water fell. Soap-bub-bles were strikingly manipulated. It was shown that a bubble could be stretched, that one could be blown inside another and rolled about without breaking either, that one bubble could push another without really touching it, and finally, that two bubbles could be made to coalesce into one by electrifying them, but that if one enclosed the other the inner one would not be af-fected by the small electric discharge.

Unvulcanized rubber is stated on German authority to be by no menas water proof, as is shown by its ready absorption of moisture. Rolled plates of rubber were found to be capable of taking up in two hours from eight to 55 per cent of water at 60 der. C., the absorption increasing with the degree of compression, and a piece of the best Para rubber kept under water of 50 deg. was nothing but a slimy mass in two months. This is suggested as a possible cause of the deterioration of the crude gum in transportation.
