



METCALF AND LOEB

DON'T QUITE AGREE

Secretary of Navy Says That Big

Fleet of Battleships is Go-

ing to the Pacific.

Oakland, Cal., July 4 .-- Secy. of the Navy Victor H. Metcalf, in an interview this morning, confirmed the report that a large part of the United States navy will be seen in Pacific waters next winter. Eighteen or 20 of the largest battleships will come around Cape Horn on a practise cruise and

will be seen in San Francisco harbor. 'Many false impressions have gained "Many false impressions have gained circulation about the proposed move-ment of this part of the United States navy," said Secy. Metcaif. "I have held all along that there was practically no significance to this movement from a military standpoint. I might have stat-ed hefore leaving Washington exactly what I am saying now. I thought as the news concerned the people of the Pacific coast today would be an appro-priate time to announce the exact plant.

priate time to announce the exact plane. "It is the policy of the navy depart-ment at the present time to keep the fleet in American wateris as much as possible. It is also our policy, as has been stated, to keep as large a number of battleships together as pos-sible. We might as well spend the money that is devoted to our navy in American ports as abroad. In the past we have sent squadrons to various Eu-repean nations with less advantage than in keeping them at home. "I have planned this cruise around Cape Horn for the practise of the squadron. How long they will spend in these waters I cannot say at present. I can promise the people of Oakland and San Francisco that they will see one of the finest naval spectacles ever witnessed in Pacific waters. "T hope that the talk of Japaness troubles and of international differ-ences may be dropped by all of the newspapers. It is without foundation. The story that Ambassador Aoki is in distavor with his own government I be-lieve purely an invention. I know of

lieve purely an invention. I know of how reason at the present time why Japan and the United States should not be on the friendliest of terms."



Reserves from two precincts had to be called to queli the rioting. the rioting. DISAFFECTION AMONG EAST INDIANS INCREASING. London. July 5.—Dispatches from In-dia report that the disaffection among the natives is rapidly increasing. Ac-cording to a correspondent who has made several tours of Bengal, revolt is being preached in many provinces, and the natives are being trained to fight. He declares that the seriousness of the situation is hardly realized by the Eu-ropeans in India or at home. Former-ly the discontent was confined to a few agitators, but now it has spread among the aristocracy and landholders as well as among the peasants and coolies. An organization known as national volunteers has branches in nearly every town and village, and tales of lawlessness and oppression by these volunteers come from every quarter. The local police is weak, the correspondent states, and the people are gradually losing respect for order and authority. An alarming feature of the situation, it is stated, is the growing number of assaults on Euro-peans. Another correspondent at Simia re-ports that sedition is extending into the central provinces. JUNE FIRE LOSSES.

In United States and Canada Aggre-

gate \$14,765,000. gate \$14,160,000. New York. July 5.—The losses by fire in the United States and Canada during June, as compiled from the records of the Journal of Commerce and Commer-cial Bulletin. aggregate \$14.765.000. This brings the total fire waste for the first half of 1807 up to \$117.457.500, as compared with \$377,665.550 for a like portion of the year 1906, but these fig-ures include \$280,000,000, chargeable to the San Francisco configration.
