For the very slender girl who does not look so well in those long, loose coats so becoming to her stouter sister, there is an attractive little model this season, which, in the original of the picture, is developed in moose gray broadcloth and trimmed with smoked brown velvet. The material is laid in deep box pleats at the shoulders and stitched flat over a loose fitting vest lined as far as the natural waistline. The number of pleats and the thickness of material in the waist makes this portion of the garment quite heavy enough for midwinter wear. The yoke extends in a panel effect down the front, and is edged all around with a pleating of brown velvet, the neck being finished with a flat velvet collar and the fronts fastened double-breasted with large velvet-covered buttons. The belt is of velvet and the sleeves, full leg of mutton pattern, are finished with a high cuff outlined at the top with a pleating of velvet and trimmed with two brown velvet buttons on the top of the arm. This like the rest of the garment is machine stitched in a darker shade than that of the material. The skirt of the coat is not lined, but the waist portion is finished with a lining of brown orkeda silk, an expensive soft silk particularly adapted to this use.
