## GROOK NEATLY CAUGHT

Detective Shannon Spots a Man Acting Suspiciously on Street Car and Runs Him Down.

E. J. E. Ryan, 24 years of age, well dressed and good looking, was arrested last night by Detective Shannon, and at police headquarters Ryan admitted that he was a grafter and a "dip," that he was arrested on suspicion of being one of the pickpockets who have been playing their trade in Salt Lake for some time. The thieves are called "dips" by the police, and while Ryan admits being a grafter, he declared he had "turned out" in Salt Lake.

Detectives Shannon and Wilson were on a Second South street car last night when they observed Ryan and a companion on the rear platform. The men were noticed jostling passengers getting on and off the car. At Second South and West Temple street Ryan leaped from the car and Shannon followed. Ryan started north on West Temple with Shannon hot pursuit. The man jumped into a carriage and told the driver to take him with all possible speed to the depot. Just at that moment a boy came along on a bicycle and Shannon, who had borrowed the wheel and gave chase. He caught his man in a roominghouse on Fourth West street. Ryan's companion got away. The man will be charged probably with grand larceny. The police claim to have a good case against him.

## WOOTEN SQUELCHED

Police Court Attorney Sat Down Upon By Judge Diehl.

"Lawyer" Wooten, a man who occasionally has a case in the public court, received a sound lecture from Judge C. E. Diehl yesterday afternoon. Wooten was defending an Italian named Bonifazio, who before the court on the charge of using profane language. The man was arrested at the instigation of F. D. T. # CITY RECORDER SQUANDERS COIN

He Helps the Tribune, Though By Adding to Taxpayers' Burden.

## DOUBLES EXPENDITURES.

Advertising Carelessly Done Will Have To Be Done Again and Property Owners Pay the Bill.

It has developed that a number of proposed sewer extensions which were advertised at considerable cost, and in some instances bids submitted, were not preceded by the required notice of intention. As early as July 3, 1907, the city recorder was instructed to give the said notice, and while no action was taken in that direction, bids were advertised for on March 11 of this year. When the latter advertisement had run for a period of 14 days, the mistake was discovered, and now the matter will have to be gone over again from the very start.

## TWO OTHER CASES.

Similar conditions exist as to extensions 124 and 129, excepting that in the latter the contract was actually let and work about to begin when the error was discovered.

No. 122 is bounded as follows: Second North from West Temple to Second West; west side of First West from First North to Third North; east side of Third North from First West to Second West.

Extension No. 124 includes: South side of Third South from First West to Second West; north side of Fourth South from First West to Second West; south side of Fifth South from First West to Second West; west side of Second West from Fourth South to Fifth South.

## OPPOSED TO MACADAM.

First Avenue Abutters Want More Substantial Paving.

The engineering committee of the city council, at a meeting held last evening, decided that First avenue is to be paved with asphaltum, instead of macadam, as previously planned. The change was made in answer to a petition filed by taxpayers along that thoroughfare. The cost will be materially added so, but the property owners are willing to stand their portion of the increase, and the city will be called upon to pay something like \$4,000 more than its portion would have been with the original plan. The contract has been let to P. J. Moran, and work on the proposition will begin at once.

Again the matter of paving north Main street was brought before the committee. W. S. McCormick and Russell G. Schulte are opposing to it, that the work be done as soon as practicable. No definite conclusion was arrived at. The North Temple and South Temple street sewers will have to be completed before the paving can be done. The finance committee has decided to award the contract for such connection to James Kennedy.

## COMMISSIONER'S FIRST ACT.

Decides Nevada Northern Must Build Freight Depot at Ely.

The first decision handed down by the Nevada Northern Railroad commission was that the Nevada Northern Railroad company should erect a freight depot at Ely instead of maintaining it at Ely City, a mile or more away. The opinion was rendered by Chairman Bartlett of the commission, and covers the situation thoroughly.

The order provides that on or before May 1, 1908, the Nevada Northern should begin the construction of a depot at Ely. The building must have at least 1,800 feet of floor space to accommodate the freight and also 1,000 feet of sidetrack at the place. The decision is the result of a long fight between the residents of Ely and the railroad.
