

Bingham Con. and Other Properties

The properties of the Bingham Consolidated Mining company in Bingham consist of the Commercial mine in the upper part of the camp and adjoining the domains of the United States and Boston Consolidated companies. The Commercial has contributed ore to the smelter during the year to the amount of from 250 to 250 tons per day, according to the requirements of the smelter. In the eastern part of the district the Bingham company owns the Dalton & Lark, Miner's Dream, Antelope, Sampson and a portion of the Yosemite No. 1 group. From the Dalton & Lark from 150 to 400 tons have been sent out for treatment. The output of this property, too, has been regulated by the smelter requirements.

The Eagle & Blue Bell mine of Tinajas, the control of which is in the hands of the Bingham Consolidated people, has supplied the smelter with an average of 30 tons per day.

United Bingham Active.

The United Bingham property, ad-

ately west of Bingham. At the present writing, it still has not been completed, the distance of over 1,200 feet, and is being pushed ahead as rapidly as the men operating the machine drills can drive it.

While the original purpose of the tunnel was to mine ore from the ledges of the Bingham district, the distance, and during the first year of its existence, from several hundred to six thousand feet, as the work has progressed the fact has developed itself that can be put to other uses as well such as the development of the enterprise for power purposes or the extraction of ore from other mines, milling and smelting purposes. The company's officers are confident that this feature of the enterprise will be the source of no small amount of revenue in the future.

Another great feature, which is bound to contribute largely to the success of the enterprise, is the new plant of the portal of the Bingham West Dip tunnel to the large smelters now being

constructed west of Bingham. The officers of the company are as follows: President, Francis M. Lyman, Jr.; secretary, F. M. Bishop; treasurer and manager, Milano Pratt, who with Hugh S. Gowans, constitute the board of directors.

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
BINGHAM WEST DIP COMPRESSOR PLANT.

Joining the Silver Shield mine in upper Bingham canyon, has been carrying forward a vigorous campaign of exploration and the new year will dawn with the prospects ever so bright for that property.

Bingham West Dip Tunnel.

The Bingham West Dip Tunnel company is carrying out a plan, conceived several years ago, of opening the mineral bearing ledges of Bingham at great depth by means of a deep tunnel driven from the west side of the Ogallala range of mountains, immedi-

ately east of the tunnel. The tunnel is well equipped to carry on the work rapidly and efficiently. During the present year a larger compressor plant was installed, as well as many other modern devices. The course of the tunnel is from northwest to southeast, thus cutting at right angles and at great depth all of the commercial veins dip toward the mouth of the tunnel. The bulk of the mineral veins of the Bingham district is from east to west, and thus they will be cut at an angle of about 45 degrees by the tunnel.

Mines of Gold Mountain and Marysville Districts

SUBSTANTIAL progress has been made during the year in the Gold Mountain district. While the shipments of ore and bullion have been no greater than they were during 1904, they have been no less. On the other hand, the campaign of development in the various mines of the district has been carried forward with much more zeal than ever before and has resulted in bringing about a decided betterment in conditions. The outlook for the future never looked so promising as it does at the close of this year, 1905.

Progress at Sevier Co.

Among the most important improvements made in the camp since Christmas is the completion of the Sevier Consolidated mines with facilities for the operation of that property upon an extensive scale, besides the purchase of additional property which places the company in possession of a little more than 1,000 acres of mineral bearing property. Early in the year the directors of the company made an appropriation for the construction of a new mill, capable of handling 100 tons of ore per day. This plant is almost completed and will go into commission early in January. An electric power plant has been built in Clear Creek canyon; also a seven-mile transmission line, over which power will be conveyed for use in the operation of the mine and mill. The company has improved its water supply and will be prepared to begin the new year as one of the important gold producers of the state.

Chances at the Annie Laurie.

At the Annie Laurie mine the management has been successful in increasing the ore reserves. The mine has been enlarged and improved, and now has capacity for the handling of 300 tons

of ore per day. Among the other improvements made by the company was the construction of a new auxiliary electric power plant on the Sevier river 12 miles from camp, so that in the future there will be experienced no shortage of power during low water season.

Large Bodies of Mill Ore.

The Madsen Gold Mining company, of which P. W. The Providence Properties.

Among the newer properties of the Gold Mountain district that are beginning to attract a great deal of attention are the groups consisting of 12 claims that have just been purchased by the Providence Gold Mining company, of which John M. Schneiders of Salt Lake is the president.

The Providence properties bid fair to develop into a bonanza of big importance, the owners of the company entering the mining field. The company's location covers an extensive area, the veins from which the Annie Laurie is getting its rich and there is but the slightest reason to doubt but that they are entirely correct, for recent developments made in the Annie Laurie Extension located directly on the same veins, and forms the high divide between Fish Creek and other streams on the west, and Deer Creek canyon to the east.

It was just about twenty years ago that the Sevier and other properties were discovered and located on Gold Mountain, but until about twelve years ago the camp was prospectively thin, that is, nothing of importance had been developed up to that time of any particular consequence. There were plenty of properties that gave promise of becoming bonanzas, but the owners were possessed of limited means and without capital, progress was slow. When the
