NEW STORY OF ATTEMPT ON LINCOLN'S LIFE

Mrs. Coggshall of Springfield, O., Tells How Effort Was Made to Kill Him In Baltimore With a Bomb.

Her story is that a bomb was hurled into the coach occupied by Lincoln as it was standing in the station in Bal-limore, and that her husband first showed Lincoln through the door of the ar and then burling the bomb through a window of the coach away from the prowd.
