## FOREIGN.

LONDON, 4.—Thousands of laborers employed in loading steamers at Liverpool, struck work yesterday, in consequence of an increase of their hours of labor; some of the steamers preparing to put to sea were delayed.

The American Consul at Sheffield has furnished the Liverpool Courier official statistics of the local trade with the United States for the quarter ending March 31st, 1876, showing a total of \$585,000 against \$2,275,000 for the first quarter of 1873. It is rumored that a great Sheffield concern is about to remove to the United States.

VERSAILLES, 4.—In the deputies, to-day, Ricard, Minister of the Interior, announced that the law abolishing the state of siege would be promulgated to-morrow.

Gambetta, to-day, was elected president of the budget committee. On assuming the Chair he said:—"We possess a government which affords every security for legitimate interests, and a wise, well-ordered and progressive republic must now devote its attention to the development of the moral and material interests."

CAIRO, 4.—Hostilities having ceased in Abyssinia and negotiations for peace with the envoy of King Kassa being in progress, Prince Hassar, commanding the Egyptian forces, has received orders to retire to Egypt.

ATHENS, 4.—The steamer *Agri-genti*, from the Piraeus for Italian ports, collided with the English steamer *Hilton Castle*, off Cape Malla, on the south coast of the Morea, to-day; the *Agri-genti* immediately sank, and of sixty-four persons on board, nine of the crew and twenty passengers were drowned.

LONDON, 5.—Sir Henry Campbell has formally resigned the captaincy of the British National Rifle Team. The Russian press severely criticizes Disraeli's remarks in the House, March 23, on the debate on the royal titles bill, that Russia's conquest of Tartary is well known throughout India, and that the Queen's assumption of the title of Empress of India would be received as a sign of our determination to maintain our Indian Empire.

LIVERPOOL, 5.—The strike of dock laborers has ended, the men resuming work on the old terms.

PARIS, 5.—A decree was promulgated to-day, fixing the first of May, 1876, as the date for the opening of the universal exhibition.

The Government has ordered the prefects to permit the sale of all newspapers, without exception, by ordinary news dealers and in the streets.

The *Journal Official* promulgates the law, immediately raising the state of siege.

LONDON, 5.—Mr. Home, a prominent spiritualist, died suddenly on Saturday while travelling on the railway from St. Petersburg to Berlin.

A ferryboat, which was being driven across the River Dee at Aberdeen, was capsized, to-day, in midstream by the violence of the current; the boat was crowded with passengers, and it is feared that thirty persons were drowned.

The recent accounts of massacres of Christians are confirmed. The Christians are calling for reprisals, and five thousand insurgents have entered the districts of Birhacs and Traniok.

RIO JANEIRO, 5.—The ravages of the yellow fever are increasing.

LONDON, 6.—A Vienna dispatch reports that the inhabitants of Behacs, district of Bosnia, have revolted; the rebels cheered for the Emperor of Austria. They have been joined by some Mohametans, and have captured a quantity of powder.

The Earl of Sheffield died yesterday.

LONDON, 6.—The *Daily News* this morning severely condemns the action of the United States Senate in rejecting the nomination of Dana as Minister to England.

The following particulars of the disaster yesterday on the river Dee at Aberdeen have been received. The day was the sacramental fast day, set apart by the Scotch church for preparation for Sunday communion. People celebrate it as a holiday and crowds were crossing from Aberdeen to Torry village, on the opposite bank of the river in overloaded ferry boats, which are drawn across the Dee by

wire ropes. One boat, containing about sixty persons, despite the waterman's warnings, was pulled by the passengers into the middle of the stream. Where it was swamped. The scene during the night was distressing on the banks or searching in the river for bodies, but up to three a. m. none had been recovered. Twenty-two persons, including men, boys, and girls, are known to be drowned. It is believed the total loss of life will not exceed thirty.

Cambridge is now considered certain to be the winner of the inter-University boat race, barring accidents. Betting to-day is three to one.

It is understood that the owners of the *Strathmore* emigrant ship, lost in the South Pacific, have decided to suitably acknowledge the humane and generous conduct of the captain of the American whaler, *Young Phoenix*.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer, replying to a question of Gourley, said the government had no intention to initiate financial measures in Egypt, and had received no proposals from the Khedive regarding the execution of Cave's recommendation.

In the Commons, to-night, an increase of a penny on a pound in the income tax was agreed to; 113 to 52.

Five thousand workmen in the coal mines of North Derbyshire have struck work in consequence of a proposed reduction of wages.

LONDON, 7.—The Lennie mutineers were examined at the Bow Street police court, to-day, and formally committed for trial on charges of mutiny and murder.

The board of trade returns for March show that the value of exports has declined four per cent. over last year, and ten over the year before, and that imports had declined ten per cent. over last year and eight over the year before.

The Lord Mayor and Corporation will give a grand dinner and ball to celebrate the Prince of Wales' safe return from India; the Prince has accepted an invitation to be present.

The report published in the *Paris Siecle* of the death of Home, the Spiritualists, is untrue.

Wm. E. Gray, of New York, who was up before the Bow Street Police Court yesterday for alleged forgeries, was remanded to April 31st, but as the United States legation is unwilling to base charges on the papers now here, he will be further remanded on Thursday to await the arrival of an American officer, now on his way here, who will bring two fresh indictments.

It is thought that the extradition of Chas. Brent, charged with frauds on the Falls City Tobacco National Bank of Louisville, and Gray, will be governed by the decision in Winslow's case. Nothing further can be said at present about the negotiations. The U. S. Government has presented its views of the matter, and it is supposed that Great Britain is now taking the opinions of her law officers.

ROME, 9.—Garibaldi has written to the Prime Minister, accepting the donation of 100,000 lire offered him by the nation some time ago.
